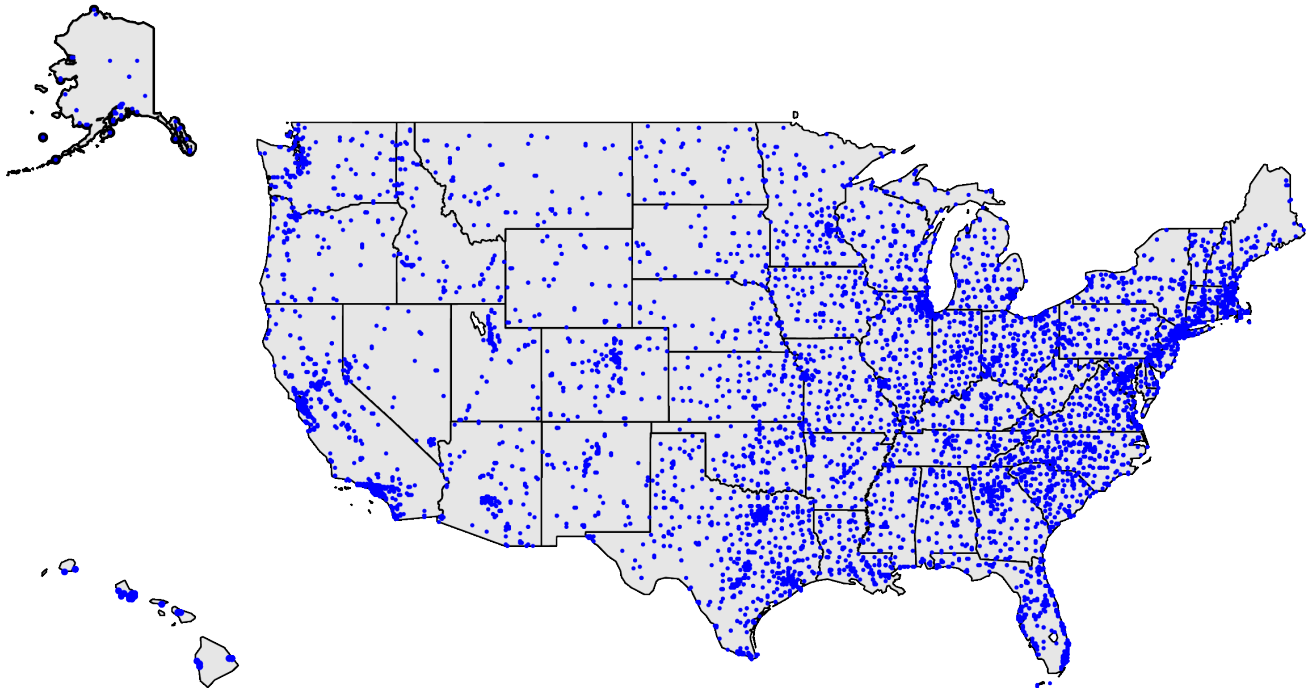


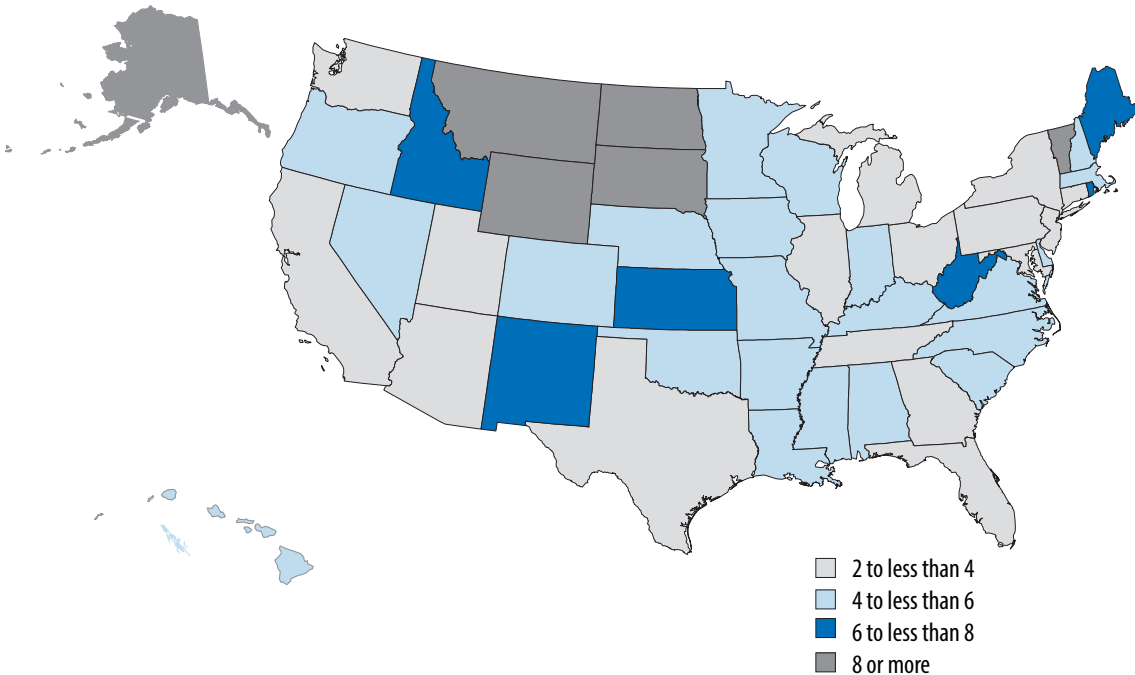
MAP 1
