

Important note

Correctional Populations in the United States presents numbers that describe persons under some form of correctional supervision. In this compilation the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) seeks to help users by:

- making readily apparent the links between different correctional institutions or methods in each State.
- suggesting the similarities and differences between States and regions as our system of criminal justice responds to both common and disparate needs.
- permitting comparisons, however limited they must be, with previous years' statistics.

Helping readers find a single number

Through an index at the end of the volume, readers can find all topics treated in tables. The index numbers refer to tables.

Footnotes give extra information about how to interpret the numbers in the tables.

Category definitions are available in three places: the explanatory notes in appendices of some sections, the questionnaires also found in the appendices, and the definitions of common terms in the volume's introduction, page 3.

To make comparisons across years or between jurisdictions

BJS makes every effort to report numbers that are consistent in interpretation with those of the past and between separate jurisdictions in the present. Data collection rules and reporting protocols that fit historical statistics and that impose the least burden on respondents are used.

Some jurisdictions depart from the reporting conventions, and some categories for counting have shifted over the years. Users who try to draw conclusions from such numbers, comparing years or jurisdictions, must take into account special circumstances and changes. Footnotes, table notes, explanatory notes, and other material highlighting the tables must be consulted for a full understanding of the data.

History of U.S. corrections statistics

In 1850 the Federal Government, in cooperation with the States as a part of the Seventh Decennial Census, began counting prisoners in 32 States and in the territories of Minnesota, New Mexico, Oregon, and Utah. Between 1850 and 1870, U.S. marshalls administered the census of prisoners as part of a special schedule of social statistics. Including prisoners in its count of persons in institutions, the 1880 report indicated there were 61 inmates in State prisons per 100,000 residents. By 1890 Nevada had the highest per capita rate, 203, and Wyoming had the lowest at 16. In that same year New York had 136 prisoners per 100,000 residents, and California had 169.

In 1910 the introduction of the indeterminate sentence was described in prisoner statistics; 21% of State prisoners on January 1 had received such sentences. The 1923 report said that more than a half of the prison admissions that year were under indeterminate sentences and observed that such sentences resulted in wide ranges between minimum and maximum sentences and disparities in setting release dates. In 1926 the Bureau of the Census began the annual collection of prisoner statisties, and the report for that year described the goal of the effort as the collection of data to "show the application of penal policies for various classes of offenders and in different parts of the country." That first annual report in 1926 provided information by jurisdiction on admissions, releases, sentences and time served, inmates under sentence of death, recidivism, and crowding-issues of major concern today.

During the past 60 years the partnership between the Federal Government and the States and localities in collecting corrections data has grown and prospered.

In 1950 the program was transferred from the Bureau of the Census to the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) in the Department of Justice and in 1971 to

the predecessor agency of the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA). LEAA added the statistical series on local jails (1970). probation (1979), and parole (1976).

All of the major reporting series and projects of the corrections unit, Bureau of Justice Statistics, are outlined under "Data sources" below. The Bureau of the Census serves as the data collection agency for these series. When Congress created the Bureau of the Census in the late 19th century, it charged the agency with the responsibility to account for prisoners. That involvement has continued intermittently and in various forms until the present, as shown in the following chronology that sketches the evolution of the statistical reports grouped in this volume:

1904. Prisoners and Juvenile Delinquents, 1904 reported movements rather than individuals. Prison officials served as enumerators.

1923. Prisoners, 1923 presented adults separate from juveniles.

1926. Prisoners in State and Federal Prisons and Reformatories began as an annual report that continued until 1946. The report included a special section on prisoners under sentence of death. From 1946 to 1970 the Federal Bureau of Prisons published the annual figures. The Law Enforcement Assistance Administration followed for 9 years until BJS was created in 1980. (The Bureau of the Census has acted as collecting agent since 1972.)

1947. The Bureau of Prisons began the separate annual reports on prisoners under sentence of death. The LEAA and then BJS continued the reports until 1984. The Bureau of Justice Statistics will continue to publish annual bulletins about the death penalty and persons sentenced to death; the more detailed statistics will appear in the corrections volume.

1965. The National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD), a nongovernmental organization, started the Uniform Parole Reports project under Federal contract.

1970. LEAA conducted its first 1day count of jails.

1974. LEAA, with the Bureau of the Census, surveyed a national random sample of offenders in State prisons. The survey, repeated in 1979 and 1986, collected information about personal background and criminal history and inquired about drug and alcohol usage.

1976. The NCCD and LEAA annual reports covered parole data beginning in 1976.

1978. The Bureau of the Census counted prisoners in U.S. jails; the Bureau repeated the complete enumeration in 1983.

1979. The first annual report on parole and probation appeared, published by BJS. This Department of Justice agency will continue issuing summary reports, reserving detailed data for the corrections statistics volume.

1982. The Bureau of the Census completed the first annual jail sample survey for BJS. Bulletins containing data from the sample survey will be supplemented by the corrections volume.

Definitions of common terms used in tables

Custody. To have custody of a prisoner, a State must hold that person in one of its facilities. Early statistical reports gave custody counts that largely have been replaced by jurisdiction counts of State prison populations. A State may have custody of a prisoner over whom another State maintains jurisdiction. For example, State A's prison burns, and State Z houses the A inmates temporarily. State Z has custody; State A has jurisdiction. The tables present both kinds of counting procedures, with jurisdiction counts being more complete: States that report only on custody are noted.

Detention status. This term distinguishes between prisoners, usually in jail, who were convicted or who were awaiting judgment.

Discretionary parole. A release from prison to supervision is discretionary when it is decided by a board or other authority.

Good-time. When correctional authorities deduct time from a prison or jail sentence, often to reward or to encourage good behavior, they give good-time. When the good-time is tied to a specific action, such as working in prison industry or performing a meritorious deed, it is called "earned."

Hispanic origin. A person of Hispanic origin may be of any race; however, a few States treat the ethnic category as a racial one. Reporting officials usually rely on selfdefinition, but some States classify according to surname.

Jurisdiction. Jurisdiction refers to a unit of government or to the legal authority to exercise governmental power. According to the latter meaning, the prisoners under a State's jurisdiction may be in the custody of local jails. (See "custody.")

Mandatory parole. Mandatory parole results from statutory and correctional guidelines, and no judgment by a panel or board is required for release of a prisoner to supervision outside of prison.

Maximum sentence length. Some jurisdictions sentence offenders to a range of years; the larger number in that range is the most that a prisoner may serve on a sentence. Often, good-time is subtracted from the maximum sentence. When the tables report on prisoners with sentences longer or shorter than a year, the maximum sentence is used where applicable.

Movement. In corrections, a movement is an admission to or a release from a status--prisoner, parolee, or probationer. A transfer between facilities does not, unless specifically noted, count as a movement.

One-day count. For a 1-day count a jurisdiction or facility is asked to report how many people were on its roll on a certain day. The average daily population is a year's total number of people on the roll each day, divided by the number of days. The methods of counting in aggregate do not yield estimates of either the number of persons in a status during a year or the average amount of time persons remain in a status.

Race. Classification by race often depends on the reporting program and the State. A few States reported two categories: white and nonwhite. A few others categorized Hispanic offenders as belonging to "other race." Numbers of persons with certain racial backgrounds were sometimes estimated.

Reporting time. The prison, probation, parole, and capital punishment figures are from December 31, 1986, unless otherwise noted. The Bureau of the Census surveyed jails on June 30, 1986; they previously took a complete census of jails on June 30, 1983.

Revisions. Many States revise the yearend number reported for the previous year. Those revisions are made in the total, not the detail. For example, the numbers of blacks, whites, and members of other races for 1985 were not changed by a State in 1986 to equal its revised 1985 total.

Youthful offender status. State legislatures create the youthful offender status through statutes that provide for special sentencing, commitment, or record sealing procedures for young adult offenders adjudicated in a criminal court, as opposed to a juvenile court. The offenders may be above the statutory age limit for juveniles but below a specified upper age limit.

NPS8B, C. Complete survey of States to determine any significant changes in statutes or case law relating to the death penalty.

NPR1. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on probation by jurisdiction.

UPR1. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on parole by jurisdiction.

CJ5. Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of more than 100 people.

CJ5A. Annual sample survey of local jails to estimate the population of jails in jurisdictions holding a daily average of fewer than 100 people.

CJ42. Census every 5 years of all State-operated, community-based correctional facilities to record their characteristics.

CJ43. Census every 5 years of all State prison facilities to record their characteristics.

CJ3. Census every 5 years of all jail facilities to record their characteristics.

CJ17. Census every 2 years of privately operated facilities for the detention or commitment of juveniles.

CJ29. Census every 2 years of publicly operated facilities for the detention or commitment of juveniles.

NCRP-1B. Individual record data on each offender released from prison during a year, covering data contained in NCRP-1A, offenses and sentences since admittance, time spent in halfway houses, time served, and category of discharge.

NCRP-1C. Individual record data on each offender discharged from parole supervision, covering data contained in NCRP-1A and -1B, parole discharge, and category of discharge. Series based on interviews of sampled prisoners

SIJ-43. Survey every 5 years of a random sample of prisoners in jails to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.

NPS-25. Survey every 5 years of a random sample of prison inmates to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.

Special studies of recidivism

BJS has conducted two major studies of the arrests and convictions of offenders after they are released from prison.

Recidivism I. This project analyzed arrests and convictions of a cohort of offenders paroled from prison in 20 States. It has incorporated into the parole records FBI data on each parolee's contacts with criminal justice agencies. The selected offenders were 18 to 22 years of age when they were released from prison in 1978.

Recidivism II. This data collection program will permit the analysis of criminal justice contacts for a sample of 15,000 prisoners released from prisons in 10 States in 1983. The effort merges FBI, State, and local police records with correctional records.

Explanatory notes

The 1986 Annual Survey of Jails was the fourth annual survey sponsored by the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) and conducted by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. This series follows a similar effort made by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) during the 1970's.

The sample surveys yield estimates of the national jail population for those years that lack a complete enumeration. Full censuses were done on February 1, 1978, and June 30, 1983.

The 1986 survey, conducted on June 30, included 1,142 jails in 893 jurisdictions--counties, municipalities, or townships that administer 1 or more jails. A jurisdiction with an average daily inmate population of 100 or more in the 1983 census automatically entered the survey. Such units of government, referred to as certainty jurisdictions, accounted for 614 jails and 189,329 inmates, or 74% of the total estimated inmate population.

Administrators of jails in jurisdictions with large jail populations reported the number of inmates held because of crowded facilities elsewhere, jail capacity, and reasons for court orders, if any. (See the questionnaire CJ-5.) The other jurisdictions in the survey belonged to a stratified random sample of jurisdictions with an average daily inmated population of less than 100.

The survey excluded five types of facilities from the count:

- lock-ups that house persons for less than 48 hours;
- Federal facilities;
- State facilities;
- privately operated facilities;
- the combined jail-prison systems of Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

Data were obtained through mailed questionnaires. Two follow-up mailings and phone calls elicited a response from every sampled jail not in a certainty jurisdiction (a jurisdiction with such a large population that it has 100% certainty of entering the sample). Ninety-five percent of the facilities in jurisdictions with large populations responded.

Explanatory notes

Every 5-7 years the Bureau of the Census interviews a national sample of inmates in State correctional facilities.

Using 1986 survey data the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) has published two special reports, from which the tables in this section are primarily drawn: Profile of State prison inmates, 1986 and Drug use and crime. These reports contain additional data not reproduced in this compilation.

BJS will publish more reports giving survey results. Interested investigators can also access the computerized data through the Criminal Justice Archive and Information Network maintained by the Inter-university Consortium for Political and Social Research at the University of Michigan.

Methodology

The sample design is a stratified two-stage selection with the probabilities proportional to the size of the correctional facility. In the first stage the sample is selected independently from two frames: the first for men only and a second to oversample women. Within each frame, facilities are stratified by size and by census region. In the second stage interviewers visit each selected facility and select a sample of inmates using predetermined procedures.

In 1979 interviewers completed 11,397 questionnaires at 215 prisons with a selected sample of about 12,000 inmates. In 1986 interviewers conducted 13,711 interviews at 275 facilities, using a sample of about 15,000 inmates.

The estimates for the entire inmate population come from the interviews that are multiplied by a weighting factor. The factor is calculated from the original probability of prisoners entering the sample. It is adjusted for variable rates of nonresponse and by two ratios. The first ratio adjustment accounts for sample effects; the second brings the sample population as close as possible into agreement with the known distribution of the entire population.

Criminal history and drug use history summarize what the inmates recounted. An interviewer first asked how many times an inmate was sentenced as a juvenile or as an adult and then sought further detail for each conviction. The sentences could be to probation or to some form of custody and could include up to 10 incarcerations for serious offenses or for charges like public drunkenness and disorderly conduct. The same procedure was followed in gaining information about drug or alcohol use--asking for a prisoner's general answer before focusing on details. Questions covered 10 drugs and 3 kinds of alcoholic drinks and the occasion of their use.

COVERAGE

In this report, you are asked to report populations and movements of all adults and youthful offenders adjudicated through the adult court and sentenced to a maximum of at least one year and one day and admitted to or released from the **jurisdiction** of your State prison system, even though they may be housed in another state or in a Federal institution or in a county facility. For example, you should report the admission or release of prisoners sentenced for offenses in your State but housed in another state for safekeeping. You should report the admission or release of state inmates held in local jails as a direct result of overcrowding in state facilities if these inmates are considered to be under your State's **jurisdiction** while they serve in local jails. You should not report the admission or release of inmates your State was merely housing for other states.

JURISDICTION POPULATION ON JANUARY 1

The jurisdiction population on January 1, 1986 (Item 1) should equal the number of inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence on December 31, 1985 (Item 5a). Revise Item 5a for 1985 if appropriate.

ADMISSIONS

- a. New court commitments Include all inmates who were admitted with all new sentences, that is, these inmates were not readmitted for any sentences. This category includes probation violators entering prison for the first time on the probated offenses. Do not include parole violators with new sentences as new court commitments.
- b. Parole violators with new sentences Include all parolees returned with new sentences.
- c. Other conditional release violators with new sentences — Include all conditional releases (other than parole) returned with new sentences, for example, returns from shock probation, from supervised mandatory release, etc.
- d. Parole violators only, no new sentences Include all parolees returned only for formal revocations of parole which were not accompanied by new sentences. If the parole was not formally revoked, that is, the parolee was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.
- e. Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences Include all conditional release violators other than violators returned only for formal revocations of conditional release which were not accompanied by new sentences. If the conditional release was rot formally revoked, that is, the conditional release violator was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.
- f. Transfers from other jurisdictions Include all inmates transferred to this State's jurisdiction to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the admission if your State does not acquire jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your State.
- g. AWOL returns, with or without new sentences Include all returns from AWOL. AWOL is defined as failure to return from authorized temporary absences such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence.
- h. Escapee returns, with or without new sentences — Include all returns from escape. Escape is defined as unlawful departure from a State correctional facility or from the custody of State correctional personnel.

ADMISSIONS — Continued

- i. Returns from appeal/bond Include all inmates reinstated to correctional jurisdiction from longterm jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report returns from short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court (that is, where the State retains jurisdiction).
- j. Other admissions Include all other admissions not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these admissions in the "Notes" section on page 2.

RELEASES

Unconditional — An unconditional release occurs only if the released inmate cannot be reimprisoned for any sentence for which he was in prison.

- Expirations of sentence Include all inmates whose maximum court sentences minus credits have been served.
- b. Commutations Include all inmates whose maximum sentences have been changed (lowered) to time served to allow immediate unconditional release.
- c. Other unconditional releases Include all other unconditional releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.

Conditional — A conditional release occurs if the released inmate, upon violating the conditions of his release, can be imprisoned again for any of the sentences for which he was in prison.

- d. Probations Include all inmates who have been placed under probation supervision and conditionally released. Include all shock probation releases.
- Supervised mandatory releases Include all inmates who must, by law, be conditionally released. This type of release may also be called mandatory conditional release.
- f. Paroles Include all inmates conditionally released to parole. Enter only releases officially entitled "parole."
- g. Other conditional releases Include all other conditional releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.

Death

- h. Executions Self-explanatory
- i. Illnesses/natural causes Self-explanatory
- j. Suicides Self-explanatory
- Accidental injury to self Include all inmates who accidentally caused their own deaths (for example, a fall from a ladder, mishandling electrical equipment).
- Death caused by another person include all inmates whose deaths were caused accidentally or intentionally by another inmate or prison personnel.
- m. Other deaths Include all other deaths not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these deaths in the "Notes" section on page 4 or page 6.

RELEASES — Continued

Other Releases

- n. AWOLS Include all failures to return from an authorized temporary absence such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence.
- o. Escapes from confinement include ali unlawful departures from a State correctional facility or from the custody of State correctional personnel
- p. Transfers to other jurisdictions include all inmates who were transferred from this State's jurisdiction to another to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the release if your State does not relinquish jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your State.
- q. Releases to appeal/bond include all inmates released from correctional jurisdiction to longterm jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court where the State correctional system retains jurisdiction.
- r. Other releases include all other releases not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these releases in the "Notes section on page 4 or page 6.

JURISDICTION POPULATION DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates under this State's jurisdiction on December 31, regardless of the location of the inmates. Do not include other jurisdictions' inmates (for example, inmates from other States, pre-trial detainees) merely housed in your prisons. These inmates, however, are enumerated in item 6, "Custody Population."

CUSTODY POPULATION DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates in this State's custody, that is, housed in your State correctional facilities on December 31. Do not include State inmates housed outside State prison facilities (these are reported under "Jurisdiction Population," item 5). Include other jurisdictions' inmates (for example, inmates from other States, the courts, local jails) housed in your State's facilities.

OVERCROWDING DECEMBER 31

Include all inmates housed in local jails on December 31, as a direct result of overcrowding in your State's prisons. Do not include inmates held in local jails for other reasons, (for example, work release, court appearance, etc.). Explanatory notes by jurisdiction

Alabama

For adults entering or leaving parole (tables 6.4 and 6.5) Alabama provided no details.

Alabama did not report sex, Hispanic origin, and sentence length. It estimated the number of black and white parolees.

An unknown number of county or city parolees are included in the State count.

Alaska

Data for approximately 180 parolees on mandatory parole were not available.

Arizona

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes 179 Interstate Compact cases.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes 9 early discharges.

Arizona estimated the data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and length of sentence. "Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes 526 Mexican Americans or Mexicans.

Arkansas

Arkansas terminated 297 persons from parole when they absconded. Of the 297 absconders, 119 were still at large on December 31.

California

California combined counts from the California Department of Corrections and the California Youth Authority.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) those returned to jail, new charges pending, are included with persons with parole revoked. California did not report parolees transferred to other States. "Other" includes 7,953 suspended parolees at large, absconders.

"Other" race (table 6.7) includes seven persons of unspecified race.

Colorado

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) Colorado reported all of them as mandatory.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) Colorado reported all in three categories: successful, returned to prison, or deceased.

Colorado placed absconders in an inactive caseload but did not omit them from the yearend counts.

Connecticut

For "Unknown" race (table 6.7) the State included 117 Hispanic parolees.

Delaware

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) those returned to prison were included with those discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant.

The State did not supervise persons released from prison after less than 1 year of incarceration.

District of Columbia

The District amended its December 31, 1985, figure to include 238 inactive cases and 926 persons under warrants.

For "Other status" of supervision (table 6.3) the District included 1,100 persons under warrants.

Florida

Florida did not report Hispanic origin and sentence length data and estimated data on sex and race.

Georgia

Georgia did not report data for Hispanic origin and sentence length and estimated data on sex and race.

Hawaii did not report data for race and Hispanic origin.

For "Other status" of supervision (table 6.3) the State did not specify the status of 25 parolees.

Idaho

Idaho did not report data for race and Hispanic origin.

The State included current absconders in the yearend population.

Illinois

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes 580 absconders transferred to the apprehension unit and 772 other discharges.

For "Unknown" race (table 6.7) the State reported 844 Hispanic parolees.

Illinois estimated all demographic data from the percentage distribution of 10,882 parolees under active supervision. It had no demographic information on absconders and parolees supervised out of State.

Indiana

Indiana estimated the number of American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Hispanic Americans.

Data for sex, race, and Hispanic origin were unknown.

Current absconders were terminated from parole and were not included in the population count.

Kansas

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes discharged absconders (147), expiration of sentence (7), and other exits (161 out-of-State parolees).

Kansas estimated data for race and Hispanic origin. It reported no demographic data on parolees supervised outside Kansas.

Absconders are monitored apart from the regular parole caseload and did not appear in the yearend counts. Of the 147 parolees who absconded in 1986, an unknown number remained in that status at yearend.

Kentucky

Kentucky revised its previously reported count for December 31,

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Discretionary releases from prison" includes mandatory releases. "Other" includes 332 intra-State transfers.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) those successfully completing parole include releases from active supervision, final discharges, and closed cases.

Kentucky did not report demographic and sentence length data.

Louisiana

Louisiana revised its previously reported count for December 31. 1985. The 372-person difference between the counts is unexplained.

Louisiana did not report Hispanie origin.

Maine

Maine abolished parole in 1976.

Maryland

For "Other status" of supervision (table 6.3) Maryland reported 533 parolees in some form of custody.

Maryland did not report data for Hispanic origin.

Massachusetts

Massachusetts estimated the yearend 1985 count, entries and exits.

For "Unknown" race (table 6.7) Massachusetts included 401 Hispanic and 47 Cape Verdian parolees.

Michigan

For "Others" released from parole (table 6.5) Michigan reported three discharged by court.

Minnesota

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes work releases (126).

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Successfully completed" includes absconding as well as being transferred or discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant.

For "Unknown" race (table 6.7) the State reported 28 Spanish-speaking parolees and 4 others.

Mississippi

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes a data adjustment of 23.

Mississippi placed absconders indefinitely in an inactive caseload and omitted them from the population count.

Missouri

Missouri revised its previously reported figure for December 31, 1985, because of late data.

Circuit court judges can grant judicial parole to county jail inmates. The offenders are supervised as probationers and were counted in the probation report.

Montana

Montana estimated the number of persons leaving parole.

Nebraska

Nebraska revised its previously reported count for December 31, 1985.

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes six Hispanic parolees.

Nebraska estimated race, Hispanic origin, and length of sentence.

Nevada

Nevada estimated all data because of budgetary constraints.

The State did not report demographic and sentence length information.

New Hampshire

New Hampshire did not report data for race or Hispanic origin.

The State places absconders on an inactive case list.

New Jersey

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes recalls by the court and persons discharged by paroling authority decree.

New Mexico

New Mexico revised its previously reported count for December 31, 1985. The difference of 23 parolees is unexplained.

New Mexico estimated all data. For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes parolees transferred from other States and semiactive parolees.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Successfully completed parole" includes satisfactory and unsatisfactory discharges. "Other" includes 113 closed Interstate Compact cases, 4 in-State transfers, and 87 miscellaneous types.

Current absconders are terminated from parole and were not included in population counts.

New York

New York revised the previously reported count for December 31, 1985.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) those counted as successfully completing parole include parolees discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant. Parolees returned to incarceration with new charges or parole revocation pending were reported as having completed the proceedings.

New York did not report parolees from county jails (331 in 1986).

North Carolina

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes an adjustment of 323.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Returned to prison with revocation pending" includes all those returned to prison or jail.

North Carolina did not report data for Hispanic origin and sentence length.

North Dakota

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes two Hispanic parolees.

Ohio

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes 275 parolees placed in other States.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes 189 cases closed other than by final release.

Ohio did not report data for sex, race, or Hispanic origin.

Oklahoma

The change in the number of exits from 1985 to 1986 resulted from two new laws: the House Arrest Law and the Capacity Law (Emergency Releases).

Transfers to another jurisdiction remain in the Oklahoma parole count in an administrative caseload.

Oklahoma estimated data for sex, race, and Hispanic origin.

Oregon

Oregon revised its previously reported count for December 31, 1985, to reflect a correction in the computer files.

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) those reinstated were reported as discretionary releases from prison.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes parolees discharged to custody, detainer, and warrant and all parolees returned to prison or jail.

Pennsylvania

Pennsylvania added 26,622 local parolees to its count, revising a previously reported figure for December 31, 1985.

The State could not provide sentence length data in the categories of more than 1 year or 1 year and less. It reported that of a total of 39,008 parolees, 11,557 were sentenced to 2 years or more and 27,451 had sentences of less than 2 years.

Absconders were included in the reported population.

Rhode Island

Under status of supervision (table 6.3) the 58 persons supervised out of State include 7 in prison. "Other" includes the following: 25 men and 2 women detained on warrants at the Rhode Island Adult Correctional Institutions, 2 persons in Federal prisons, 4 persons supervised by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, and 2 persons in the Federal Witness Protection Program.

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Reinstatement" includes those persons who were reparoled after revocation of the original parole and who either had no new sentence or had a new sentence of less than 6

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Discharged to detainer/warrant" includes those discharged from Rhode Island parole while serving out-of-State sentences. "Other" includes six absconders, two of whom were returned to prison in 1987.

South Carolina

The State did not report data for Hispanic origin and sentence length.

South Dakota

South Dakota reported the data for June 30, 1985, to June 30, 1986.

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes 92 persons with suspended sentence to probation or work release.

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes four Hispanic parolees.

Tennessee

Tennessee revised its previously reported count for December 31, 1985, to include out-of-State parolees.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) the State estimated all but the number returned to incarceration. "Other" includes an estimated 50 Interstate Compact cases.

Tennessee estimated the number of men and women (table 6.6).

Texas

Texas reported the data for September 1, 1985, to August 31,

Texas estimated the data for sex, race, and Hispanic origin.

Utah

Utah revised its previously reported count for December 31, 1985.

Vermont

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) Vermont included those prisoners with new sentences or new charges pending under "With parole

For type of supervision (table 6.3) Vermont could not distinguish active and inactive cases and reported both under "Other."

Vermont could not report Hispanic origin and length of sentence.

Virginia

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes 476 intra-State transfers, 256 transfers from other States, 36 Virginia cases returned to Virginia from other States, and 56 unknown types of entry.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" includes all those returned to incarceration; "Other" includes 475 intra-State transfers, 211 terminations of out-of-State cases, and 82 exits of unknown type.

Virginia estimated the numbers for race and sex based on percentages in March 1987. Data for status of supervision were estimated from percentages in April 1987.

"Other" type of supervision includes one person pardoned.

The State did not report Hispanic origin.

Washington

Washington estimated the number of persons entering and leaving parole.

For adults entering parole (table 6.4) "Other" includes 47 entries from conditional release from prison. Washington did not count separately those who entered parole following mandatory release from prison or reinstatement.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) "Other" includes all categories.

Washington did not report sentence length.

Washington placed absconders indefinitely in an inactive caseload and omitted them from the population count.

West Virginia

"Unknown" race (table 6.7) includes one Hispanic parolee.

Wisconsin

Wisconsin revised its previously reported figure for December 31,

For type of supervision (table 6.3) all persons supervised out of State or with inactive supervision are included in "Active supervision."

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) all parolees returned to incarceration are reported under "With parole revoked."

"Unknown" race (table 6.7), 209 persons, includes 88 Hispanic parolees.

Wyoming

Wyoming revised its previously reported count for December 31, 1985, to account for late entries.

Federal parole system

The Federal system revised its previously reported count for December 31, 1985.

For adults leaving parole (table 6.5) persons discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant are counted under "Discharged as absconder." All parolees returned to incarceration are included in "With parole revoked."

The Federal system excluded 3,878 special parolees under active supervision; special parole is a period that can commence after completion of regular parole. Military parolees (531) were also excluded.

Explanatory notes

The statistics reported for capital punishment may differ from data collected by other organizations for a variety of reasons:

- Inmates are originally added to the National Prisoner Statistics deathrow counts when they enter correctional facilities rather than when judges pronounce sentence.
- Following the year when prisoners are first counted, their admissions to death row or releases as a result of court order are attributed to the year in which the sentence or court order occurred; prior years' figures are therefore adjusted to reflect dates of court decisions. For example, a prisoner sentenced in November 1984 and entering death row in January 1985 would be counted as an admission in the 1985 report; the 1986 report would count him or her as present on death row at yearend 1984. Similarly, a prisoner whose sentence is overturned in 1983, but who remains in the count until 1986 when the court's decision is reported, would be subtracted from the 1983, 1984, and 1985 counts.
- NPS death-row counts are always for the last day of a calendar year and thus will differ from more recent counts.

Correctional Populations in the United States, 1985 failed to include 12 inmates because of delayed reporting or because the inmates, sentenced in 1985, had not entered prison custody before December 31: Florida, 3; Louisiana, 1; Pennsylvania, 2; Missouri, 1; Tennessee, 1; Texas, 3; and Utah, 1. The report also counted as being under death sentence 28 inmates who were relieved of the sentence before 1986. The breakdown of those 28 is as follows: Arizona, 1; Arkansas, 2; California, 11; Florida, 2; Illinois, 5; Kentucky, 2; Mississippi, 1; Missouri, 1; South Carolina, 2; and Texas, 1.

The tables of persons on death row in 1986 do not include data on the one prisoner sentenced to death by a United States military court.

Except for one man, all persons under sentence of death in 1986 had committed murder. The exception, a black man in Mississippi, entered prison in 1986, convicted of capital rape of a child under age 12.






