Highlights

An estimated 4.8 million adults were under some form of correctional supervision in 1992. Nearly three-quarters of these people were on probation or parole. About 2.5% of the U.S. adult resident population were under correctional care or supervision in 1992, up from 1.1% in 1980.

Jalls

Local jails are facilities that hold inmates beyond arraignment, usually for more than 48 hours but less than a year. Local jails are administered by city or county officials.

Local jails held an estimated 442,000 adults, or about 1 in every 428 adult U.S. residents, on June 30, 1992. Men made up 91% of adult jail inmates. White non-Hispanic inmates accounted for 40% of the total jail population; black non-Hispanics, 44%; and Hispanics, 15%.

The total number of adults in jall increased 142% in the 12 years from 1980 to 1992, including an increase of 4.2% from 1991 to 1992.

Probation

More than 2.8 million adults were on probation on December 31, 1992. Probationers made up 59% of all adults under correctional supervision in 1992.


Approximately 20% of the probationers were women, a larger proportion than for any other correctional population. About 66% of adults on probation were white, and 33%, black. Two-thirds of all persons discharged from probation had successfully completed their sentences. The number of adults on probation in the U.S. increased 152% between 1980 and 1992.

Prisons

Nearly 851,000 men and women were In the custody of State and Federal prisons at yearend 1992. About 95% of all prisoners were men; 48% were white, and 50%, black.

Two-thirds of sentenced prisoners entering prison in 1992 were new court commitments and more than a quarter were parole or other conditional release violators. Among persons released from prison in 1992, 80% were placed on probation, parole, or some other type of conditional release.

The number of prisoners rose by 7.3% between 1991 and 1992, bringing the total increase since 1980 to 166%.



Parole

An estimated 659,000 adults were on parole at yearend 1992, an increase of 11.5% from 1991. Nine of every ten parolees were men. An estimated 53% of persons on parole were white; 46%, black; and 2%, of other races.

Most entries to parole were based on a parole board decision (58%). About half of all exits from parole were categorized as successful completions, while an eighth of parolees were returned to incarceration with a new sentence.


The number of persons on parole grew 199% since 1980, more than that of any other correctional population.


Capital Punishment


During 1992, 265 inmates were received under sentence of death by State prisons and 124 had their death sentences removed by means other than execution. State and Federal prisons held a total of 2,575 prisoners under sentence of death on December 31, 1992.

Nearly 60% of those under sentence of death at yearend were white and 40% were black. Half of the inmates had been under sentence of death for at least 5½ years.

Thirteen States executed 31 male prisoners during 1992. The number of executions was more than double the 14 carried out in 1991. The total number of prisoners executed under civil authority in the United States from 1930 to 1992 was 4,047.







Trends in State and Federal inmates

Dramatic growth. Between 1980 and 1992, the number of inmates with sentences of more than a year in State or Federal prisons grew by more than 530,000, an increase of nearly 168% in 12 years.

Changing demographics. An increasing percentage of the Nation's prison inmates were from racial or ethnic minority groups. The percent of sentenced prisoners who were black increased from 46.5% in 1980 to 50.3% in 1992. The percent Hispanic nearly doubled from 7.7% to 14.1%. At yearend 1992 the estimated number of sentenced Hispanic inmates (who may be of any race) totaled nearly 150,000,

Between 1980 and 1992 the number of female inmates in the State and Federal prisons rose at a faster rate (up 277%) than the number of males (up 163%). Despite their faster growth, females comprised less than 6% of all sentenced prisoners at yearend 1992. Increasing numbers of drug offenders. Drug offenders accounted for nearly a third of the increase in the State prison population since 1980. Over 9 times as many inmates were serving time in State prisons for a drug law violation in 1992 (172,300) as in 1980 (19,000). Drug offenders were 22.1% of all State inmates in 1992, up from 6.4% in 1980.

In 1992 drug offenders were almost 60% of all sentenced inmates in Federal prisons, up from 45% in 1988 (the earliest year for which comparable are available). educat The increase of more than 20,000 drug offenders over these 4 years represented nearly half of the total Federal growth. • 4


More probation and parole violators entering prison. Underlying the dramatic growth in the State prison population was a change in the relative sizes of the two principal sources of admissions — new court commitments and returned conditional release violators. As a percentage of all admissions, returned parole violators and newly admitted probation violators increased from 17.0% in 1980 to 29.5% in 1992. During the 12-year period, the number of State prison admissions each year for probation or parole violations rose from 27,000 to nearly 142,000.

Incarceration rates vary widely. Between 1980 and 1992 the rate of incarceration in State and Federal prisons more than doubled, from 139 sentenced inmates per 100,000 U.S. residents to 332 per 100,000.

These rates varied among population groups classified by age, race, sex, and educational level. In 1992, the rate of incarceration in State and Federal prisons was —

- 448 per 100,000 adults (or nearly half of 1 percent of the Nation's adult population)
- 883 men per 100,000 adult men in the U.S. population, compared to 47 women per 100,000 adult women

• 4,094 per 100,000 black male adults in the U.S. population, compared to 502 per 100,000 white male adults.



Important note

Correctional Populations in the United States presents numbers that describe persons under some form of correctional supervision. In this compilation the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) seeks to help users by—

- making readily apparent the links between different correctional institutions or methods in each State
- suggesting the similarities and differences between States and regions as our system of criminal justice responds to both common and disparate needs
- permitting comparisons, however limited they must be, with previous years' statistics.

Helping readers find a single number

Through an **index** at the end of the volume, readers can find all topics treated in the tables. The index numbers refer to the tables.

Footnotes give extra information about how to interpret the numbers in the tables.

Category definitions are available in three places: the **explanatory notes** in the appendices of sections, the **questionnaires** also in the appendices, and the **definitions of common terms** in the *Introduction* on page 5.

To make comparison across year or between jurisdictions

BJS makes every effort to report numbers that are consistent in interpretation with those of the past and between separate jurisdictions in the present. Data collection rules and reporting protocols that fit historical statistics and that impose the least burden on respondents are used.

Some jurisdictions depart from the reporting conventions, and some categories for counting have shifted over the year. Users who try to draw conclusions from such numbers by comparing years or jurisdictions must take into account special circumstances and changes. Footnotes, table notes, explanatory notes, and other material highlighting the tables must be consulted for a full understanding of the data.

Introduction

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History of U.S. corrections statistics

In 1850 the Federal Government, in cooperation with the States as a part of the Seventh Decennial Census, initiated a count of prisoners in 32 States and in the territories of Minnesota, New Mexico, Oregon, and Utah. Between 1850 and 1870, U.S. marshals administered the census of prisoners as part of a special schedule of social statistics. The 1880 report indicated there were 61 prisoners in State institutions per 100,000 residents. By 1890 Nevada had the highest per capital rate among the States, 203, and Wyoming had the lowest, 16. In that same year New York had 136 prisoners per 100,000 residents, and California had 169.

In 1920 the introduction of the indeterminate sentence was described in prisoner statistics; 21% of State prisoners on January 1 had received such sentences. The 1923 report said that more than a half of the prison admissions that years were under indeterminate sentences and observed that such sentences resulted in wide ranges between minimum and maximum sentences and disparities in setting release dates. In 1926 the Bureau of the Census began the annual collection of prisoner statistics, and the report for that year described the goal of the effort as the collection of data to "show the application of penal policies for various classes of offenders and in different parts of the country," That first annual report in 1926 provided information by jurisdiction on admissions, releases, sentences and time served, inmates under sentence of death, recidivism, and crowding — issues of major concern today.

During the past 64 year the partnership between the Federal Government and the States and localities in collecting corrections data has grown and prospered. In 1950 the program was transferred from the Bureau of the Census to the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) in the Department of Justice and in 1971 to the agency predecessor of the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA). LEAA added the statistical series on local jails (1970), probation (1979), and parole (1976).

All the major reporting series and projects of the corrections unit, Bureau of Justice Statistics, are outlined under "Data sources" below. The Bureau of the Census serves as the data collections agency for these series. When Congress created the Bureau of the Census in the late 19th century, it charged the agency with the responsibility to account for prisoners. That involvement has continued intermittently and in various forms until the present, as shown in the following chronology that sketches the evolution of the statistical reports grouped in this volume.

1904. *Prisoners and Juvenile Delinquents, 1904* reported movements rather than individuals. Prison officials served as enumerators.

1924. *Prisoners, 1923* presented udults separate from juveniles.

1926. Prisoners in State and Federal Prisons and Reformatories began as an annual report that continued until 1946. The report included a special section on prisoners under sentence of death. From 1946 to 1970 the Bureau of Prisons published the annual figures. The LEAA followed for 9 years until BJS was created in 1980. (The Bureau of Census has acted as collecting agent since 1972.)

1947. The Bureau of Prisons began the separate annual reports on prisoners under sentence of death. LEAA and then BJS continued the reports until 1984. The Bureau of Justice Statistics will continue to publish annual bulletins about the death penalty and persons sentenced to death; the more detailed statistics will appear in the corrections volume.

1965. The National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD), a non-governmental organization, started the Uniform Parole Reports project under Federal contract.

1970. LEAA conducted its first 1-day count of jails.

1974. LEAA, with the Bureau of the Census, surveyed a national random sample of inmates in State prisons. The survey, repeated in 1979, 1986, and 1991, collected information on personal background and criminal history and inquired about drug and alcohol usage.

1976. The NCCD and LEAA annual reports covered parole data beginning in 1976.

1978. The Bureau of the Census counted prisoners in U.S. jails; Census repeated the complete enumeration in 1983 and 1988.

1979. The first annual report on parole and probation appeared, published by BJS.

1982. The Bureau of the Census completed the first annual jail sample survey for BJS. Bulletins containing data from the sample survey are supplemented by the corrections volume.

Definitions of common terms used in tables

Custody. To have custody of a prisoner, a State must hold that person in one of its facilities. Early statistical reports gave *custody counts* that largely have been replaced by *jurisdiction counts* of State prison populations. A State may have custody of a prisoner over whom another State maintains jurisdiction. The tables present both kinds of counting procedures, with jurisdiction counts being more complete; States that report only on custody are noted.

Detention status. This term distinguishes between prisoners, usually in jail, who were convicted or who were awaiting judgment.

Discretionary parole. A release from prison to supervision is discretionary when it is decided by a board or other authority.

Good time. When correctional authorities deduct time from a prison or jail sentence, often to reward or to encourage good behavior, they give *good time*. When the good time is tied to a specific action, such as working in a prison industry or performing a meritorious deed, it is called "earned."

Hispanic origin. A person of Hispanic origin may be of any race; however, a few States treat the ethnic category as a racial one. Reporting officials usually rely on self-definition, but some States classify according to surname.

Jurisdiction. Jurisdiction refers to a unit of government or to the legal authority to exercise governmental power. According to the latter meaning, the prisoners under a State's *jurisdiction* may be in the custody of local jalis. (See "Custody.") Mandatory parole. Mandatory parole results from statutory or correctional guidelines, and no judgment by a panel or board is required for release of a prisoner to supervision outside prison.

Maximum sentence length. Some jurisdictions sentence offenders to a range of years; the larger number in that range is the most that a prisoner may serve on a sentence. Often, *good time* is subtracted from the maximum sentence. When the tables report on prisoners with sentences longer or shorter than a year, the *maximum sentence* is used where applicable.

Movement. In corrections, a movement is an admission to or a release from a status — prisoner, parolee, or probationer. Unless specifically noted, a transfer between facilities does not count as a movement.

One-day count. For a 1-day count a jurisdiction or facility is asked to report how many people were on its roll on a certain day. The *average daily population* is a year's total number of people on the roll each day, divided by the number of days. The methods of counting in aggregate do not yield estimates of either the number of persons in a status during the year or the average amount of time persons remain in a status.

Race. Classification by race often depends on the reporting program and the State. A few States reported two categories: white and nonwhite. A few others categorized Hispanic offenders as belonging to "Other race." The number of persons with certain racial backgrounds were sometimes estimated.

Reporting time. The prison and capital punishment figures are from December 31, 1992, unless otherwise noted. The Bureau of the Census surveyed jalls on June 30, 1992; they previously took a complete census of jalls on June 30, 1988.

Revisions. Many States revise the yearend number reported for the previous year. Those revisions are made in the total, not the detail. For example, the number of blacks, whites, and members of other races for 1991 were not changed by a State in 1992 to equal its revised 1991 total.

Youthful offender status. State legislatures create the youthful offender status through statures that provide for special sentencing, commitment, or record sealing proceduros for young adult offenders adjudicated in a criminal court, as opposed to a juvenile court. The offenders may be above the statutory age limit for juveniles but below a specified upper age limit.

CJ-7. Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on parole by lurisdiction.

NPS-8. Characteristics of persons admitted to, under, or released from a sentence of death during the year.

NCRP-1A. Individual record data on each offender admitted to prison during the year, covering race, age, Hispanic origin, jall credits, prior prison credit, offenses and number of counts, and maximum and minimum sentence.

NCRP-1B. Individual record data on each offender released from prison during the year, covering data from NCRP-1A, offenses and sentences since admission, time spent in halfway houses, time served, and category of discharge.

NCRP-1C. Individual record data on each offender discharged from parole supervision, covering data contained in NCRP-1A and NCRP-1B, parole discharge, and category of discharge.

Series based on interviews of sampled prisoners

random sample of fail inmates to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.

NPS-25. Survey every 5 years of a random sample of prison inmates to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.

Special studies of recidivism

BJS has conducted two major studies of the arrests and convictions of offenders after they are released from prison.

Recidivism I. This project analyzed arrests and convictions of a cohort of offenders paroled from prison in 20 States. It incorporated into the parole records FBI data on each parolee's contacts with criminal justice agencies. The selected offenders were 18 to 22 years of age when they were released from prison in 1978.

Recidivism II. This data collection program permits analysis of criminal justice contacts through 1986 for a sample of 16,000 prisoners released from prison in 11 States in 1983. The effort merged FBI, State, and local police records with correctional records.

Historical statistics

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Technical note

To estimate the total correctional populations in tables 1.1 and 1.2, the four correctional populations are assumed to contain individuals with only one status at a time. This assumption is not valid. Multiple correctional statuses may occur because —

- probation and parole agencies are not always notified of new arrests, jail entries, or prison admissions;
- absconders on agency caseloads in one jurisdiction may actually be incarcerated in another jurisdiction;
- individuals may be admitted to jail or prison before the completion of formal revocation hearings by a probation or parole agency.

By adding the number of persons on probation, on parole, in jail, and in prison, we may count some persons more than once; consequently, the sum will be an overestimate of the total number of persons under correctional supervision at any one time. The magnitude of the overestimation is not known; however, data collected in previous BJS surveys of prison and lall inmates indicate that the number of Inmates doublecounted may be small relative to the total population under correctional supervision. Results from the 1989 Survey of Inmates of Local Jalls indicated that 28% of the jail inmates were on probation and 10% were on parole at the time of their admission to jall. Results from the 1991 Survey of Inmates in State Correctional Facilities also indicated that 23% of the State prisoners were on probation and 22% were on parole at the time of their admission to prison.

If the survey results are applied to the total jail and prison populations in 1992, and if all of these inmates are assumed to have been doublecounted, then the total number of doublecounted inmates would be 513,000, or about 10.8% of the estimated correctional population. This is an extreme assumption.

Somewhat lower estimates are generated If it is assumed that the survey figures should be applied only to those jail inmates who are unconvicted and to prisoners who are technical violators of parole or probation supervision. Under this assumption, the doublecount would be an estimated 162,000 inmates, or 3.4% of the total correctional population.

Doublecounting may also include an unknown, but relatively small, number of persons on both probation and parole.

Explanatory notes

The 1992 survey was the ninth annual collection sponsored by the Bureau of Justice Statistics. Complete enumerations of the Nation's jails are conducted every 5 years. Annual surveys — which collect data on all jails in jurisdictions with 100 or more jail inmates and on a sample of all other jails — are carried out in each of the 4 years between the full censuses. The reference date for the 1992 survey was June 30, 1992. Full censuses were done on February 15, 1978; June 30, 1983; and June 30, 1988.

A local jail is a facility that holds inmates beyond arraignment, usually for more than 48 hours, and is administered by local officials. Specifically excluded from the count were temporary lockups that house persons for less than 48 hours, physically separate drunk tanks, and other holding facilities that did not hold persons after they had been formally charged. Federalor State-administered facilities, and the combined jail-prison systems of Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawall, Rhode Island, and Vermont. Included in the universe were five locally operated jalls in Alaska and eight jalls that were privately operated under contract for local governments.

The 1992 survey included 1,113 jails in 795 jurisdictions --- counties, municipalities, or townships that administer 1 or more jails. A jurisdiction with an average daily inmate population of 100 or more in the 1988 census automatically entered the survey. Such units of government, referred to as certainty jurisdictions, accounted for 814 jails and 362,217 inmates, or 81% of the total estimated inmate population.

The other jurisdictions in the survey belonged to a stratified random sample of jurisdictions with an average daily inmate population of less than 100 in the 1988 census. Data were obtained through mailed questionnaires. Two follow-up mailings and phone calls elicited a response from 995 of all jalls. For the four jails in certainty jurisdictions and the one jail outside a certainty jurisdiction not responding to the survey, data were adjusted by applying the average growth factor for facilities in the same stratum and region and with the same type of inmates (men, women, or both sexes).

Explanatory notes by jurisdiction

Because many States update their population counts, the January 1, 1992, numbers may differ from these previously published for December 31, 1991.

Federal

"Other, unknown, or not reported" (table 3.5) consists of 40 statistically reopened cases (closed by error).

"Successful completion" (table 3.6) includes discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant and incarcerated under new sentence. "Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of 1,041 statistically closed cases (date expired or misfiled).

Alabama

The State could report a count of probationers only for January 1 and for December 31. All other data are for local jurisdictions.

Detailed data for entries, exits, sex, race, Hispanic origin, supervision status, and offense type are estimated.

Alaska

The January 1 count was estimated.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 89 Hispanics (table 3.7).

Arizona

Arizona has 2 reporting agencies, 1 State and 1 local.

January 1 and December 31 counts were estimated (table 3.2). For one agency, the December 31, 1992, probation population was estimated by multiplying the State growth rate by the population on December 31, 1991.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" supervision status includes 2,407 persons supervised out-of-county (table 3.4). "Incarcerated under current sentence" represents total revocations and includes incarcerated under new sentence (table 3.6). "Other, unknown, or not reported" exits include deaths.

Arkansas

The State estimated all data. All data exclude 1,124 interstate compact cases supervised for other States.

Probationers not included in counts are those in which the Arkansas circuit courts administered probation without giving jurisdiction to the Department of Community Punishment.

"Successful completion" and "other, unknown, or not reported" exits include discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant (table 3.6). "Other, unknown, or not reported" includes administrative closures.

"Other" offense type consists of 453 mlsdemeanors (table 3.9).

California

In California, probation is a county function. These data, collected by the California Law Enforcement Information Center, cover convicted defendants who are actively supervised by county probation departments.

Current absconders are terminated from probation and omitted from the probation population count.

All types of probation status are categorized as "direct imposition of probation" (table 3.3).

"Probation without incarceration" includes (table 3.5) probation with incarceration and other entries.

"Successful completion" exits include absconders and discharges to custody, detainer, or warrant (table 3.6). "Incarcerated under current sentence" includes incarcerated with new sentence. "Other, unknown, or not reported" exits include transfers, loss-of-jurisdiction cases, and deaths.

Colorado

Colorado has 9 reporting agencies, 1 State and ϑ local.

All data are estimated. An estimated 384 absconders were not included in this report.

The probation populations were estimated for two of the reporting agencies. For one agency, the population was estimated by multiplying the State growth rate by the December 31, 1991, population obtained from the Census of Probation and Parole. The second population was estimated from the 1990 Probation Data Survey (table 3.2).

The State could report a count of probationers only for June 30, 1992, and June 30, 1993 (table 3.2).

"Active" supervision status includes an unknown number of probationers supervised out of State (table 3.4).

"Successful completion" includes (table 3.6) absconders.

"White" and "black" races include an unknown number of American Indian/Alaska Natives (table 3.8). "Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes 1 Iranian and 91 Hispanic probationers.

"Misdemeanor" offense type includes an unknown number of felony, driving while intoxicated, and unspecified offense types (table 3.9). "Other" consists of 1,817 domestic violence cases.

Intensive supervision and electronic monitoring are considered the same program. Intensive supervision includes 259 domestic violence cases (table 3.10).

Connecticut

"Active" supervision status includes persons supervised out of State (table 3.4).

Detailed data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and "driving while intoxicated" offense type are estimated.

Delaware

Detailed data for exits, race, Hispanic origin, and supervision status are estimated.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 7,135 non-white probationers (table 3.8).

District of Columbia

"Direct imposition of probation" (table 3.3) includes "execution of sentence suspended" and "imposition of sentence suspended."

"Probation without incarceration" (table 3.5) includes probation with incarceration.

"Incarcerated under current sentence" exits includes incarcerations with new sentence (table 3.6). "Other, unknown, or not reported" consists of 4 O.T.S. rejections (other unconditional releases).

Detailed data for sex, race, and Hispanic origin are estimated.

"White," "black," and "other" races include American Indian/Alaska Natives and Asian/Pacific Islanders (table 3.8).

Florida

Florida has 14 reporting agencies, 1 State and 13 local.

Adult probationers not included in this report consist of inactive cases, including cases unavailable for supervision (such as persons in treatment programs, State prison, and county jall). Detailed data for entries, exits, sex, race, Hispanic origin, type of offense, status of probation, and supervision status are estimated.

"Absconded" supervision status includes 54 warrants (table 3.4).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" consists of 225 probationers picked up on warrants (table 3.5).

"Discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" exits include an unspecified number of absconders (table 3.6). "Other, unknown, or not reported" includes absconders and suspended probationers, as well as exits by revocation, dismissal of "old" warrants, reissuance of bonds, and administrative closure.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes 735 Hispanic probationers (table 3.8).

"Other" offense type (table 3.9) includes 5,139 DWI's, 643 criminal traffic charges, 18 non-criminal traffic charges, and 2 Circuit Civil cases (domestic violence).

"Electronic monitoring" includes 150 inmates removed from the county jail who may or may not have been probationers and 18 persons monitored through a private agency (table 3.10). The count for intensive supervision includes 13,006 probationers under Community Control House Arrest, a component of intensive supervision.

Georgia

"Successful completion" (table 3.6) includes absconders, incarcerations under new or current sentence, and deaths.

Detailed data for race, Hispanic origin, and probation status are estimated.

Illinois

Adult probationers not included in this report consist of 38,575 inactive administrative cases, 3,776 specialized D.U.I. program cases, and 953 Intensive Probation Supervision cases. Detailed data for exits, sex, and race are estimated.

"Successful completion" (table 3.6) includes deaths.

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"White," "black," and "other, unknown, or not reported" races include American Indian/Alaska Natives and Asian/Pacific Islanders (table 3.8). "Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes Hispanic probationers.

"Other" offense type consists of 2,435 traffic offenses (table 3.9).

Indiana

Data were obtained from the 1992 Indiana Probation Report, which was propared by the Division of State Court Administration. Counts refer to adult felons and misdemeanants only.

"Active" supervision status includes probationers supervised out of State (table 3.4).

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"Active" supervision status includes probationers supervised out of State (table 3.4).

Missouri

All data are estimated.

Missouri has 2 reporting agencies, 1 State and 1 local.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" probation status includes diversion cases (table 3.3).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" entries consist of diversion cases (table 3.5).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits include transfers, releases from supervision, probationers who have completed payment of fines, and persons placed "off records" (table 3.6),

"Other" offense type consists of city ordinance violations (table 3.9).

Montana

"Split sentence" and "execution of sentence suspended" (table 3.3) are estimated.

"Active" supervision status includes persons supervised out of State (table 3.4).

"Probation without incarceration" (table 3.5) is estimated and excludes 149 clients revoked and reinstated during reporting period.

"Successful completion" (table 3.6) includes absconders,

The number under intensive supervision includes those under electronic monitoring (table 3.10).

Nebraska

All data are estimated based on the percentage of adults in the probation population.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 769 Hispanic probationers and 692 persons of unknown race (table 3.8).

Nevada

All types of probation status are categorized as direct imposition of probation (table 3.3).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" entries (table 3.5) and detailed data for offense type (table 3.9) are estimated.

"Successful completion" (table 3.6) includes deaths.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes 864 Hispanics (table 3.8).

New Hampshire

"Successful completion" exits include absconders and discharges to custody, detainer, or warrant (table 3.6).

New Jersey

New Mexico

New Mexico has 2 reporting agencies, 1 State and 1 local.

Adult probationers not included in this report consist of persons supervised by the felony probation department at the State probation and parole level.

"Active" supervision status includes some probationers of unknown status (table 3.4).

"Successful completion" exits include deaths and other exits (table 3.6). "Absconded" includes discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant. "Incarcerated under current sentence" includes incarcerated with new sentence.

"Not reported" Hispanic origin includes some non-Hispanic probationers (table 3.7).

"White" race includes an unspecified number of Hispanics probationers (table 3.8).

New York

The January 1, 1992, probation population includes an unspecified number of duplicate records. As a result of updating the probation records, the population decreased during the year (table 3.2).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" entries consist of an 813 adjustment residual (table 3.5).

North Dakota

Adult probationers not included in this report are persons supervised by the Cass County Probation Office.

"Successful completion" exits include absconders (table 3.6). "Incarcerated under current sentence" includes incarcerated with new sentence.

Ohlo

Ohio has 53 separate reporting agencies, 1 State and 52 local. For 7 of the 53 agencies, the December 31, 1992, population was estimated by multiplying the State growth rate by the December 31, 1991, population obtained from the 1991 Census of Probation and Parole Agencies (table 3.2).

Oklahoma

Oklahoma has 3 reporting agencies, 1 State and 2 local.

Local data reflect fiscal year ending June 1992.

Adult probationers not included in this report consist of community supervision cases that involve weekend incarceration and the rest on probation.

"Direct imposition of probation" probation status includes some execution of sentence suspended, imposition of sentence suspended, split sentence, and other persons of unspecified status (table 3.3). "Successful completion" exits include absconders (table 3.6). "Other, unknown, or not reported" includes 6 persons awaiting appeals.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes 97 Asian and Hispanic probationers (table 3.8).

Texas

Data are for year ending August 1992.

Detailed data for sex, race, and offense type are estimated.

"Incarcerated under current sentence" exits include incarcerations with new sentence (table 3.6). "Other, unknown, or not reported" exits include administrative closures.

"White" and "black" races include American Indian/Alaska Native and Asian/Pacific Islander (table 3.8). "Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes 118,683 Hispanic probationers.

"Active" supervision status includes interstate transfers to Texas (table 3.4).

Intensive supervision and electronic monitoring data are for August 1992 (table 3.10).

Utah

"Other, unknown, or not reported" entries consist of 43 reinstatements and 8 courtorder probationers (table 3.5).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of 199 discharges and revocations and 13 court appeals (table 3.6).

Vermont

a. Active — Include all probationers required to make regular contact with the supervisory probation authority in person, by mail, or by telephone. Do not include interstate compact cases supervised by your agency for another State.

b. Inactive - Include all probationers who were excluded from regular reporting, Do not include interstate compact cases supervised by your agency for another State.



For each year, the number of adult arrests for violent crimes was estimated by multiplying the proportion of persons age 18 or older who were arrested

by the estimated total number of arrests. ^dincludes murder, nonnegligent manslaughter, rape, sexual assault robbery, and aggravated assault. (See table 4.17 for estimation procedures.)

Explanatory notes

The offense distributions of State prisoners at yearend are estimated for 1979-92. Inmate surveys, conducted in November 1979, March 1986, and August 1991, provide estimates for the custody populations at yearend 1979, 1985, and 1991. When combined with counts by offense of annual admissions and releases, these surveys provide the basis for estimating the offense distributions of the other years.

The offense distributions were estimated using the following forward and backward stock-flow procedures:

1. To obtain a base population for each survey year, survey estimates were applied to counts of the total sentenced jurisdictional populations for the survey year. The 1979 survey provided estimates for yearend 1979; the 1986 survey for yearend 1985; and the 1991 survey for yearend 1991.

2. To obtain flow populations for each year, the offense distributions of admissions and releases (in percents) were drawn from annual reports of the National Prisoner Statistics (1980-82) program and the National Corrections Reporting Program (1983-92). These percents were then multiplied by the total number of admissions and releases of sentenced prisoners to obtain an estimate of the number of admissions and releases by type of offense for each year.

3. Forward estimates of the number of inmates at yearend in nonsurvey years were estimated iteratively by adding admissions and subtracting releases from the base populations. The estimated end of year distribution was then used as the base population for the next year. The process was then repeated until the subsequent survey year was reached. Data from the 1979 survey were used for forward estimates for 1980-84; data from the 1986 survey, for 1986-90; and data from the 1991 survey, for 1992.

4. Backward estimates were obtained iteratively by adding releases and subtracting admissions from the yearend base population. The estimated distribution was then used as the base population for the preceding year. This process was repeated until the previous survey year was reached. Data from the 1991 survey were used to estimate data for 1990 back to 1986; data from the 1986 survey were used to estimate data for 1984 back to 1980.

5. Final estimates were obtained by calculating a weighted sum of the forward and backward estimates. The forward and backward estimates were weighted inversely to the elapsed number of years (up to 6 years) from the base population and then summed. Forward weights were reduced by one-sixth for each year after the base survey year, and backward weights were reduced by one-sixth for each year preceding the base survey year. For example, in calculating the final estimates for 1980, the forward estimates based on the 1979 survey received a weight of .83 (or 1 minus a sixth), and the backward estimates based on the 1986 survey received a weight of .17 (or 1.0 minus five-sixths). The final estimates were then converted to proportions (table 4.8).

6. Because the 1979, 1986, and 1991 survey estimates were based on custody counts, the final estimates (which were based on the sentenced jurisdictional counts) were then converted to custody counts. To estimate the number of inmates by offense (table 4.10), the total number of inmates in physical custody was multiplied by the proportion of inmates in each offense category.

Nebraska

Nebraska revised the previously reported December 31, 1991, population of female inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Race and Hispanic origin: Numbers estimated.

Nevada

Nevada revised the previously reported December 31, 1991, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

New court commitments: May include a very small number of returns from appeal or bond.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Escapee and AWOL returns: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Custody population, unsentenced inmates: Includes persons in Nevada's Boot Camp program on December 31.

Other race: Nevada's "Hispanic" category.

New Hampshire

New court commitments: Include some returns from appeal or bond and may include other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: include parole violators who receive a new sentence after admission.

Other releases: Court-ordered releases not specified as conditional or unconditional.

New Jersey

New court commitments: Include some returns from appeal or bond. May include some transfers from other jurisdictions.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Prisoners returned (some with new sentences) from the Intensive Supervision Program, an experimental program operated by the Administrative Office of Courts.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Inmates whose admission types were not known at time of data collection.

Other conditional releases: Prisoners released to the Intensive Supervision Program.

Other race: Includes Hispanic inmates who are not classified as white or Black.

New Mexico

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Include parole violators returned with additional sentences.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Returns from community corrections program.

Other conditional release violators: Releases to community corrections program.

Cause of death: Can specify only executions.

New York

New court commitments: Include parole violators and other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Transfers from and to other jurisdictions: Include 652 male and 36 female inmates from and to the Department of Mental Hygiene for psychiatric treatment.

Other admissions: Include 59 men and 3 women returned from conditional parole deportation to the custody of the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization Services, as well as 9 men returned following erroneous release.

Unspecified causes of death: Cause of death not known at time of data collection.

Other releases: Include 13 men and 23 women for whom type of release was not indicated.

Race, white: Includes all inmates of Hispanic origin.

North Carolina

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Some prisoners serve sentences in which the term in prison is partially suspended, to be completed under probation. Although the maximum sentences of all such prisoners were more than 1 year, nearly all of them were included with those prisoners having sentences of 1 year or less. As a result, the population and movement counts of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year are understated, and the population count of inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentences is overstated. Category estimates, sentencing: Population totals are actual; populations by sentence length are estimated.

Parole violators with new sentences: Include some parole violators without new sentences and some other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions and other releases: Include an adjustment residual to balance movement data with the December 31, 1992, populations.

New court commitments: Include some conditional release violators with new sentences.

Transfers from and to other jurisdictions: Include only transfers from and to Ohio's Forensic Unit. Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Sentences vacated by courts.

Race and Hispanic origin: Include counts only of jurisdictional inmates in Ohio's custody.

Oklahoma

Sentencing information: The counts of population, admissions, and releases of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year includes some inmates with sentences of 1 year or less.

New court commitments: Include some conditional release violators with and without new sentences.

Other unconditional releases: Legislative cap releases.

Other conditional releases: Include conditional commutations and legislative cap releases to probation supervision.

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 442 men and 29 women housed in local jails solely to ease prison crowding.

Unknown race: Includes Hispanic inmates and inmates whose race was not specified.

Oregon

Oregon revised the previously reported December 31, 1991, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Inmates whose admission type was not known at time of data collection. Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Pennsylvania

Other admissions: Persons returned to the institutions by the Board of Probations and Parole on their original sentence pending revocation and those committed as technical or convicted parole violators.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other releases: Include 788 men and 31 women released to parole status who had been returned to prison pending a revocation hearing and no revocation occurred; also include 46 men and 1 women for whom type of release was not known at the time of data collection.

Other race: Pennsylvania's "Hispanic" category.

Hispanic origin: Pennsylvania's known Hispanic population.

Rhode Island

Other conditional admissions and releases: Erroneous releases by the court and returns from such erroneous releases.

Unspecified causes of death: Include an inmate murdered while on furlough.

Jurisdiction population, unsentenced inmates: Includes 19 persons held on civil contempt of court for nonpayment of child support.

Total inmate population: Jurisdiction and custody counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Rhode Island.

South Carolina

New court commitments: May include a small number of transfers from other jurisdictions.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Inmates released to the jurisdiction of the Department of Parole and Community Corrections under the Emergency Powers Act.

Tennessee

Sentencing information: The counts of population, admissions, and releases of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year includes some inmates with sentences of 1 year or less.

Parole violators with new sentences: May include some parole violators with no new sentences.

Other conditional release violators with new sentences: Include some probation and community correction program violators returned with no new sentences.

Escapee and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Conditional releases, parole: May include some supervised mandatory releases.

Jurisdiction population total: Includes 970 men and 150 women housed in local facilities to ease prison crowding. Excludes 2,680 felons sentenced to serve their sentences in local facilities.

Unknown race: Includes all inmates not classified as white or black.

Hispanic origin: Tennessee's data system does not distinguish Hispanic origin of its inmates.

Texas

Population, admissions, and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Parole violators with or without new sentences: Texas' data system does not distinguish parole violators with new sentences from those without new sentences.

Other admissions and other releases: Contain the difference between long-term admission and release movements not reported in other categories. Include prisoners returning from or leaving for long-term bench warrants and medical furloughs.

Unspecified causes of death: Include all causes of death other than by execution or those relating to HIV-infection.

Other race: Texas' "Hispanic" category.

Utah

Other unconditional releases: Inmates whose sentences were terminated by the Board of Pardons.

Vermont

Parole violators with or without new sentences: May include an undetermined number of other conditional release violators.

Unspecified causes of death: Cause of death was not known at the time of data collection.

Total inmate population: Jurisdiction and custody counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Vermont. Excludes 11 male inmates housed under contract in "local lockups," operated by county sheriffs. Vermont does not consider these local lockups as part of its integrated prison/jail system.

Population and custody counts: Made December 3, 1992.

Race: Numbers estimated, with less than 0.5% of the men classified as non-white.

Virginia

Other admissions: Include parole revocations pending (both discretionary and mandatory), transfers, and returns from appeal or bond.

Other unconditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

Conditional releases, supervised mandatory releases and parole: Include releases to detainer and transfers to other jurisdictions.

Other releases: Include persons who were returned to prison pending revocation of discretionary or mandatory parole, for whom no revocation occurred and who were being returned to parole or other supervised status.

Other race: Virginia's "Hispanic" and "other race" category.

WashIngton

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Type of admission not known at time of data collection.

Other unconditional releases; Vacated sentences,

Other conditional releases: Conditional pardons.

Other race: Inmates of mixed racial origins.

West Virginia

Conditional releases, probation: May include an undetermined number of releases to court jurisdiction for inmates declared unfit to serve in a particular minimum security institution.

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 362 men and 19 women housed in local jails solely to ease prison crowding.

Wisconsin

Wisconsin revised the previously reported December 31, 1991, population of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year.

Other admissions: Include 3 men and 1 woman returned to prison following revocation of their "special action" early releases.

Other releases: Court-ordered discharges not specified as conditional or unconditional.

Wyoming

New court commitments and unconditional releases, expirations: May include a small undetermined number of administrative turnovers (starts and expirations of consecutive sentences).

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other releases: Releases to detainer.

Other race: Wyoming's "Hispanic" category.

If the conditional release was not formally revoked, that is, the conditional release violator was held only temporarily pending a hearing, no admission occurred for NPS purposes.

f. Transfers from other jurisdictions - Include all innates transferred from another jurisdictions - Include a innates transferred from another jurisdiction to the jurisdiction of your State to continue sentences already in force. Do not report the admission if your State does not acquire jurisdiction. Do not report movements from prison to prison within your State,

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g. AWOL returns, with or without new sentences – include all returns from AWOL, AWOL is defined as failure to return from authorized temporary absences such as work furlough, study release, mercy furlough, or other authorized temporary absence.

i. Returns from appeal/bond - Include all Inmates reinstated to correctional jurisdiction from long-term Jurisdictional absences on appeal or bond. Do not report returns from short-term movements (that is, less than 30 days) to court (that is, where the state retained jurisdiction).

j. Other admissions - Include all other admissions not covered by the above categories. Please specify the nature of these admissions in the "NOTES."

This entry should equal the jurisdiction on January 1 (item 1) plus all (992 admissions (items 2a-2k).

4. RELEASES

 AWOLS - Include all failures to return from an authorized temporary absence such as work furlough, study release, mercy furt-bugh, or other authorized temporary absence.

p. Escapes from confinement – include all unlawful departures from a state correctional facility or from the custody of state correctional personnel.

q. Transfers to other jurisdictions – include all inmates who were transferred from your State's jurisdiction to another jurisdiction to continue sentences already in force. (4) Asian or Pacific islander – A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian Subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa,

(5) Other – Any other races not covered by the above categories. Please specify the ether races in the "NOTES."

(6) Not known - Any inmate whose race is unknown should be included here.

9. ETHNIC ORIGIN

(1) Hispanic – A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

(2) Not Hispanic – A person not covered by the above category.

(3) Not known - Any one whose ethnic origin is unknown should be included here.

10. HIV TESTING

a. Mark "Yes" if any inmates in your custody during calendar year 1992 were tested for the antibody to the Human Immuno Deficiency Virus (HIV) that causes AIDS.

d. Total HIV Infection/AIDS Cases - This is the sum of 11a, 11b, and 11c.

Explanatory notes by jurisdiction

Because many States update their population counts, the January 1, 1992, numbers may differ from those previously reported for December 31, 1991.

Federal

In 1987 Federal Sentencing Guidelines changed, ending parole and beginning the Supervised Release Program.

"Absconded" (table 6.5) includes discharges to custody, detainer or warrant.

"Returned to prison or jail with parole revoked" (table 6.5) includes returned to prison or jail with new sentence, revocation pending, or charges pending.

Alaska

The January 1, 1992, parole population (table 6.2) is estimated.

Alaska estimated data for "Mandatory" entries (table 6.4) and "Successful completion" exits (table 6.5).

"Successful completion" (table 6.5) includes death.

Arizona

Because of prison crowding, Arizona had provisional releases (discretionary releases other than parole board decisions).

Detailed data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and sentence length are estimated.

For adults leaving parole, "death" is estimated (table 6.5).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" (table 6.5) consists of 31 early discharge parolees. "Other, unknown, or not reported" race (table 6.7) consists of an estimated 1,184 Hispanic parolees.

Arkansas

Arkansas is phasing out the inactive supervision status and is replacing it with annual reporting (table 6.3).

For adults entering parole, "other, unknown type" consists of 454 absconders returned to custody, parolees held in another State, reactivated from detainer, and returned from another State (table 6.4). An estimated 342 absconders are not included in counts.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes 5 Cubans and 1 Mexican (table 6.7).

California

Detailed data for supervision status, race, and Hispanio origin are estimated.

"Mandatory" (table 6.4) includes discretionary entries .

"Successful completion" (table 6.5) includes discharged absconders and discharges to custody, detainer, or warrant. "Returned to prison or jall, with parole revoked" includes returned to prison or jall with revocation pending or charges pending.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of 13,995 suspensions and other exits.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes 3,375 Asians, Pacific Islanders Central and South Americans, and other parolees of unknown race who could not be shown separately (table 6.7).

Colorado

"Absconded" (table 6.3) consists of 136 parolees not previously reported.

"Discretionary" (table 6.4) includes mandatory entries. The State is phasing out mandatory parole.

"Successful completion" (table 6.5) includes discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant. "Returned to prison or jall with parole revoked" includes returned to prison or jall with revocation pending or charges pending.

Detailed data for exits, sex, race, and Hispanic origin are estimated.

Sentence length of "1 year or more" (table 6.8) includes sentences of less than 12 months.

Electronic monitoring and intensive supervision (table 6.9) are considered the same program.

Connecticut

Connecticut abolished parole in 1981 but reinstated it October 1, 1990, for persons committing offenses after July 1, 1981. At present, two sets of laws exist: laws established prior to the abolition of parole and new laws enacted when parole was reinstated.

All counts include both parolees and persons in the Supervised Home Release (SHR) program. SHR inmates are released to the supervision of a parole officer at the discretion of the Commissioner of Corrections.

"Discretionary" (table 6.4) includes reinstatements.

"Other, unknown, or unreported" (table 6.5) includes returned to prison or jall with parole revoked and revocation pending. Current absconders are not included in parole counts.

Delaware

The State estimated all data.

Active supervision status includes absconders, and parolees who are inactive or supervised out of State (table 6.3).

District of Columbia

"Other" supervision status consists of 249 administrative status parolees (table 6.3).

For adults entering parole, "other, unknown type" consists of 249 grants to consecutive sentences, detainers, or other administrative status parolees (table 6.4).

"Discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" includes both arrest and detainer warrants issued in 1992 (table 6.5).

For adults leaving parole, absconders include only parolees whose warrants were recalled/lifted or had expired. A warrant is kept on file for absconders until they are found (table 6.5).

"White" and "Black" includes American Indian/Alaskan Native and Aslan/Pacific Islander (table 6.7).

Florida

A sunset provision exists in Florida making only persons incarcerated before 1983 eligible for parole.

For adults leaving parole, "other, unknown, or unreported" consists of 149 absconder/ suspense/revocation parolees (table 6.5).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 36 Hispanic parolees and 2 persons of unknown race (table 6.7).

Georgia

"Active" supervision status includes absconders (table 6.3).

"Successful completion" (table 6.5) includes discharges to custody, detainer, or warrant.

Detailed data for sex and race are estimated. "White" and "black" includes American Indians/Alaska Natives, Asians/Pacific Islanders, other, and not known.

Hawali

Data are for the year ending June, 1992. Adult parolees not covered in this report are U.S. Mainland cases.

"Absconded" supervision status is estimated (table 6.3).

For adults entering parole, "other, unknown type" consists of 55 U.S. mainland parolees (table 6.4).

"Returned to prison or jail with parole revoked" includes returned to prison or jail with new sentence (table 6.5).

Idaho

Data include absconders.

"Active" supervision includes absconders (table 6.3).

For adults leaving parole, "absconded," "discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant," and "transferred to another State" are included in "other, unknown, or not reported" (table 6.5).

"Returned to prison or jail with parole revoked" (table 6.5) includes returns to prison or jail with revocation pending. "Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consists of 65 absconders and revoked parolees. Detailed data for race and Hispanic origin are estimated.

Illinois

Illinois estimated all demographic data from the percentage distribution of 23,304 parolees under active supervision. It had no demographic data for absconders and parolees supervised out of State.

"Other, unknown type" entries (table 6.4) consist of 1,647 out-of-State parolees and intake from interstate compact and apprehension.

"Returned to prison or jail with new sentence" (table 6.5) includes returned with charges pending. All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation pending were counted as having been returned with parole revoked.

"Other, unknown, or unreported" exits consist of 1,077 parolees released from interstate compact and apprehension.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 2,076 Hispanic parolees and 22 persons of unspecified race (table 6,7).

The number of parolees under intensive supervision includes those under electronic monitoring (table 6.9).

Indiana

Data are for the year ending July, 1992.

For adults leaving parole, "other, unknown, or unreported" consists of 249 declared delinquent absconders (table 6.5).

lowa

The State estimated all data.

"Discretionary" includes reinstatements (table 6.4).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 48 Hispanic parolees (table 6,7).

lowa considers electronic monitoring to be a component of the intensive supervision program (table 6.9).

Kansas

All data are based on a percentage distribution of total offender population which includes out-of-State offenders.

The January 1, 1992, count includes 1,975 out-of-State parolees. The December 31, 1992, count includes 1,919 out-of-State parolees (table 6.2).

Supervision status (table 6.3) excludes 690 absconders.

Kansas monitors current absconders apart from the regular parole caseload and does not include them in the January 1 and December 31 population counts. Of the 458 parolees who absconded in 1992, an unknown number remained in that status at yearend.

"Other, unknown type" entries (table 6.4) consist of 99 releases from pre-revocation confinement. Pre-revocation confinement is the confinement of technical violators whose parole is not formally revoked. Once completed, they are returned to the community on parole status.

"Absconded" and "discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" (table 6.5) are included in successful completions.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of absconders (458), expiration of sentence (334), pre-revocation confinements (78), and out-of-State exits (184).

Kentucky

"Active" supervision status (table 6.3) includes inactive, absconded and out-of-State parolees.

"Reinstatement" entries are estimated (table 6.4).

"Successful completion" exits are estimated (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of 170 cases closed for out-of-State parolees.

Louisiana

"Returned to prison or jail with parole revoked" (table 6.5) includes persons with revocation or charges pending.

Maine

Maine abolished parole in 1976. There are now 37 pre-1976 parolees under supervision and some prisoners who may still become eligible for parole.

"Out-of-State" supervision status (table 6.3) is estimated.

Maryland

Maryland does not close cases for technical violators unless a formal revocation takes place.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" supervision status (table 6.3) consists of 468 delinquents in custody.

Massachusetts

The State estimated all data.

The State supervises an unknown number of paroless from local Houses of Correction.

"Active" supervision status (table 6.3) includes absconders and out-of-State parolees.

"Mandatory, " "reinstatement," and "other, unknown type" (table 6.4) are included in "discretionary."

"Absconded," "discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant," "transferred to another State, " "death," and "other, unknown, or unreported" exits are included in "successful completion" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race (table 6.7) consists of 790 Hispanic and 14 Cape Verdian parolees.

Michigan

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits (table 6.5) consist of 2 sentence-reversed parolees.

Minnesota

"Other, unknown type" entries consist of 500 persons on work release (table 6.4).

"Absconded," "discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant," and "transferred to another State" are included in "successful completion" (table 6.5). All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked. "Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 60 Hispanic parolees and 20 persons of mixed race (table 6.7).

Mississippi

Absconders are not formally discharged. Mississippi places absconders on inactive status until they are apprehended (table 6.3).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race includes 2 Hispanic parolees (table 6.7). Mississippi discontinued electronic monitoring in 1988 (table 6.9).

Missouri

The State estimated all data.

All data exclude parolees supervised from local jalls.

"Discretionary" and "mandatory" entries include reinstatements (table 6.4).

"Returned to prison or jall with new sentence" (table 6.5) includes returned to prison or jall with charges pending. All persons sent back to prison with revocation pending are counted as having been returned to prison or jall with parole revoked. Under a special program, 612 parolees were returned to a prison treatment program and counted as having revocation pending. Failure in the program results in technical revocation, and these persons are then categorized as returned to prison or jall with parole revoked. Successful completion resulted in a return to active parole status.

Montana

"Active" super siston status includes outof-State parolees (table 6.3).

"Reinstatement" entries are estimated (table 6.4).

"Successful completion" exits include discharges to custody, detainer, or warrant (table 6.5). "Absconded" exits are estimated. All persons returned to prison or jall with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

Hispanic origin is estimated (table 6.6).

The number under intensive supervision includes those under electronic monitoring (table 6.9).

Nebraska

All persons sent back to prison with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Detailed data for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and sentence length are estimated.

Nevada

Detailed data for entries are estimated (table 6.4). "Discretionary" and "mandatory" include reinstatements.

"Death" exits are estimated (table 6.5). "Returned to prisch or jail with charges pending" includes transfers to another State.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 203 Hispanic parolees and 33 persons of unknown race.

New Hampshire

New Hampshire monitors only parolees with a sentence length of one year or more.

"Active" supervision status (table 6.3) includes parolees supervised out of State.

"Discretionary" (table 6.4) includes reinstatements.

"Returned to prison or jall with new sentence" includes returned to prison or jall with new charges pending (table 6.5). "Returned to prison or jall with parole revoked" includes returned to prison or jall with revocation pending.

Detailed data for sex, race, and Hispanic origin are estimated.

"White" and "Black" includes American Indian/Alas Antive, Aslan/Pacific Islander, and other/unknown race (table 6.7).

New Jersey

"Active" supervision status includes absconders (table 6.3).

"Returned to prison or jall with revocation pending" includes returned to prison or jall with parole revoked or charges pending (table 6.5).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of 900 persons recalled by court, discharged by parole authority, and former electronically monitored parolees.

New York

"Active" supervision status includes absconders (table 6.3).

"Successful completion" (table 6.5) includes discharges to custody, detainer, or warrant. Persons returned to prison or jail with revocation pending are counted as having been returned with a new sentence. Persons sent back to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been returned with parole revoked (table 6.5).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consisted of 1,401 Board action and 33 Court-order parolees. "Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 16,901 Hispanic parolees (table 6.6).

North Carolina

For adults entering parole, "discretionary" (table 6.4) includes mandatory entries and reinstatements. "Other, unknown type" adjusts categories to the total.

All persons returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending or with a new sentence were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). "Discharged to custody, detainer, or warrant" and "transferred to another State" were also counted under revocation.

Ohio

"Other, unknown type" entries consist of 257 placements from other States (table 6.4).

"Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of 126 interstate compact cases closed for reasons other than final release (table 6.5).

Oklahoma

"Inactive" supervision status (table 6.3) includes parolees supervised out of State.

"Successful completion" (table 6.5) includes discharges to custody, detainer, or warrant and transfers to another State. All persons sent back to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending were counted as having been returned to prison or jail with parole revoked.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 82 Hispanic and other unknown parolees (table 6.7).

Oregon

"Other, unknown type" (table 6.4) consists of 156 Transitional Leave parolees. These parolees were discharged from parole, incarcerated with revocation pending, and reinstated to parole when no revocation occurred.

"Successful completion" includes discharges to custody, detainer, or warrant (table 6.5).

All persons returned to prison or jail with charges pending were counted as having been sent back to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5). "Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of 170 transitional leave and other unknown parolees.

Intensive supervision data are estimated (table 6.9). Intensive supervision and electronic monitoring program counts include both parole and probation cases.

Pennsylvanla

Detailed data for supervision status, entries, exits, sex, race, and Hispanic origin are estimated.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consisted of 2,513 Hispanic parolees and 1,047 persons of unknown race (table 6.7).

The number under intensive supervision includes those under electronic monitoring and an unknown number of locally supervised parolees (table 6.9).

Rhode Island

"Other, unknown, or not reported" supervision status (table 6.3) includes 13 persons detained on warrants at the Rhode Island Adult Correctional Institution, 28 persons supervised by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, 3 persons in the Federal Witness Protection Program, 1 person supervised by Federal parole authorities, and 4 persons who are serving sentences on Federal convictions.

South Carolina

The January 1, 1992, parole population is estimated (table 6.2).

Releases to parole supervision under the Youthful Offender Act are not reported.

South Carolina began using the category "Revoked Technical due to charges pending" during the reporting period. Therefore, the count for "returned to prison or jail with charges pending" (table 6.5) reflects only 6 months. "Other, unknown, or not reported" exits consist of 20 pardoned parolees.

"Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of non-white and non-black parolees.

Tennessee

For adults entering parole, "other, unknown type" consists of 360 Suspension of Direct Supervision and 729 Interstate compact cases (table 6.4).

"Returned to prison or jail with new sentence" includes returns to prison or jail with parole revoked (table 6.5).

Texas

"Other, unknown, or not reported" supervision status consists of 6,645 detainers (table 6.3).

"Returned to prison or jail with parole revoked" (table 6.5) includes returned to prison or jail with revocation or charges pending and returned with new sentence.

Utah

"Less than 12 months" length of sentence consists of 7 parolees whose felony parole expired with misdemeanor parole still applying (table 6.8).

Vermont

The State reports all parolees under the "white" race category (table 6.7).

Virginia

"Discharged to custody, detainer or warrant" includes absconders and all persons returned to incarceration (table 6.5). "Other, unknown, or not reported" consists of 272 out-of-State case terminations and an unknown number of absconders. "Other, unknown, or not reported" race consists of 57 Hispanic parolees and 4 persons of unknown race (table 6.7).

Explanatory notes

The statistics reported for capital punishment may differ from data collected by other organizations. The differences occur for a variety of reasons:

• Inmates under sentence of death are originally added to the National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) counts when they enter correctional facilities rather than when judges pronounce sentence.

• Following the year when prisoners are first counted, their admissions or releases as a result of court order are attributed to the year for the sentence or court order. For example, a prisoner sentenced in November 1989 and entering prison custody in January 1990 would be counted as an admission in the 1990 report; the 1991 report would count him or her as being under sentence of death at yearend 1989. Similarly, a prisoner whose sentence is overturned in 1989 but who remains in the count until 1991 when the court's decision is reported would be subtracted from the 1989 and 1990 reports.

• NPS counts of persons under sentence of death are always for the last day of a calendar year and will differ from more recent counts. Correctional Populations in the United States, 1991, did not include 17 inmates who either were reported late to the NPS program or were not in the custody of State correctional authorities at yearend 1991: Arizona (1), California (2), Florida (5), Georgia (1), Illinois (2), Indiana (1), Mississippi (1), Pennsylvania (1), and Texas (3). Thirty-two inmates had sentences to death removed in 1991 but were not reported: Alabama (1), California (3), Florida (6), Georgia (1), Illinois (1), Kentucky (1), Maryland (1), Mississippi (5), North Carolina (1), Ohio (3), South Carolina (3), and Texas (6).

In 1992 five male prisoners in the U.S. Armed Forces were under a military death sentence for murder.
