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The JUVENILE DETENTION AND CORRECTIONAL FACILITY CENSUS, 1975 is the fourth in a new series of censuses taken on public juvenile detention and correctional facilities for the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. The three earlier censuses in this series were conducted in 1971 (ICPSR Study \#7637), 1973 (ICPSR Study \# 7639) and 1974 (ICPSR Study \# 7706).

This new series replaced the annual survey of public facilities for adjudicated juveniles conducted by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, results of which were published as STATISTICS ON PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS FOR DELINQUENT CHILDREN. The HEW series covered public-administered reception or diagnostic centers; training schools; and ranches, forestry camps, and farms. The BJS-sponsored series was expanded to include detention centers and shelters (facilities intended principally as temporary residences for juveniles awaiting court action) as well as halfway houses and group homes.

In addition to collecting data on the characteristics of the Nation's non-Federal public facilities for juveniles, the JUVENILE DETENTION AND CORRECTIONAL FACILITY CENSUS, 1975 for the first time gathered data on juvenile facilities in the private sector. However, due to confidentiality requirements, private sector data are not accessible through a public use tape. Information concerning private facilities may be obtained from the Governmental Organization and Special Projects Branch, Governments Division, Bureau of the Census, Suitland, Md. 20233.

STUDY DESIGN
Methodology

The 1975 Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facility Census, was designed to gather data on nationwide complex of residential facilities that held juvenile offenders in custody. The 1975 census, partially in response to the passage of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, was expanded to include private as well as public facilities.

Facility Selection Criteria

The facilities covered in the 1975 census were residential juvenile establishments operated by state or local governments or by private entities as detention centers; shelters; reception or diagnostic centers; training schools; ranches, forestry camps, and farms; and halfway houses and group homes. For purposes of tabulation and analysis, the first three of these types of facilities can be classified as short-term institutions, whereas the last three were categorized as long-term facilities.

To have been included in the 1975 census, juvenile detention and correctional facilities in the public sector were required to have been in operation at the time the census was conducted (February 1976), to have been in operation at least a month before the census reference date (June 30, 1975), and to have had a resident population in which juveniles made up at least 50 percent. The last criteria, however, did not apply to facilities that held youthful offenders in addition to juveniles; these facilities were included in the census even though their youthful offender population outnumbered the juvenile component.

In adtition to meeting the criteria for public establishments, private facilities included in the census had to demonstrate that at least 10 percent of their resident population were classified as adjudicated delinquents, persons in need of supervision, voluntary admissions, persons awaiting transfer to another jurisdiction, or persons held pending disposition by the courts. Excluded were facilities in which more than 90 percent of the residents were dependent and neglected or other nonoffenders.

Specifically excluded from the 1975 census were juvenile detention centers operated as a part of local jails but lacking a separate staff or budget; Federal juvenile facilities; nonresidential facilities; foster homes; and facilities exclusively for drug abusers, alcoholics, dependent and neglected, unwed mothers, the emotionally disturbed, or the mentally retarded.

Census Procedures and Response Rate

Names and addresses of public and private facilities for the 1975 census were based on an updated version of the mailing list used in 1974; from the 1974-75 edition of the DIRECTORY OF CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTIONS AND AGENCIES, published by the American Correctional Association; and the 1975 edition of STATE COMPREHENSIVE LAW ENFORCEMENT PLANS, prepared by each State for BJS. This list was then sent to juvenile correctional authorities in each state for review and correction.

The initial mailout of the 1975 Public Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facilities Census (CJ-17) questionnaire was sent to 971 public facilities; of these, 350 were mailed to 41 central reporting units. A copy of form CJ-17 appears in Appendix $A$. The remaining 621 questionnaires were mailed directly to individual facilities, as was the 1975 Private Juvenile Detention and Correctional Facilities Census (CJ-29) questionnaire, which was sent to 1,723 private facilities. See Appendix $A$ for a copy of form CJ-29. Not all of these facilities met the stipulated criteria and, accordingly, were excluded. Institutions that failed to respond initially were mailed second and third requests, as appropriate. A subsequent follow-up to those still failing to report was made by telegram or telephone.

An overall response rate of 100 percent was achieved for public facilities that met the selection crit.eria; the rate for private facilities was 95 percent. For the few private facilities that ultimately did not respond to the census, data were supplied from the questionnaires returned in the 1974 Census.

Respondents were requested to provide estimates for data that could not be obtained from available records. They also were asked to submit expenditure information on a fiscal year basis, such as or the period from July 1, 1974, to June 30, 1975. Many provided information on such a basis; however, other reference periods, such as a calendar year, were accepted.

#### Abstract

[1] Indicates the variable and reference numbers. A variable and reference number are assigned to each item in the study. In this codebook, documenting the archived dataset, these numbers are identicial. Should the data be formed into a fixed length record file, new variable numbers may be assigned or created. The reference number would remain unchanged and correspond to those in this codebook.


[2] Indicates the abbreviated (24 character maximum) variable label used within OSIRIS to identify each variable description list.
[3] Indicates the designation of missing data. In this example, a code value equal to nine $(M D=9)$. Although these values are defined as within the missing data categories, this does not mean that the user should not or can not use these code values in a substantive role if he/she so desires.
[4] Indicates the sequential location and width of this variable within the record when the data are stored on magnetic tape. In this example, the variable named "LEVEL OF GOVERMENT" is one column wide and located in the 12 TH column within the record.
[5] Indicates the location by deck and column (s) of this variable when the data are on cards or in card image form.
[6] A variable containing data with implied decimals is denoted by the message, "IMP DEC=XX", where $X X$ is the number of decimal places implied (not punched) in the variable.
[7] Indicates the full text of the question supplied by the original collectors of the data. This is the wording used on the original questionnaire.
[8] Indicates an additional comment or explanation appended to the variable description.
[9] A variable which has a footnote associated with it is denoted by the message, "SEE NOTE (S) $X$ ", where $X$ is the number of the footnote referenced.
[10] Indicates the code values occurring in the data for this variable.
[11] Indicates the textual definitions of the codes.

FILE STRUCTURE FOR pUBLIC FACILITIES

The data are available from the ICPSR in two formats: a card image file and an OSIRIS dataset. The card image file contains 9 decks per respondent in a format based on 80 column punched cards. The data are sorted by respondent with all decks for a case together in ascending order. The OSIRIS dictionary gives the format and other information for each variable in the OSIRIS data file. The dictionary or diction-ary-codebook file is used in conjunction with the OSIRIS software package. The OSIRIS data file is constructed with a single logical record of 655 bytes for each respondent.

The OSIRIS data file can be accessed directly by software packages which do not use the OSIRIS dictionary by specifying the tape locations of the desired variables. These tape locations are given in the OSIRIS dictionary-codebook.

ICPSR PROCESSING INFORMATION

The ICPSR has added to the data a series of identification variables. The first variable is a unique study identification number [7707] that the ICPSR has given to this study. The second variable is the ICPSR version number. Starting with one, it would then increment by one each time the ICPSR re-released the study. The third variable is a file number that indicates the particular file sequences in the complete dataset. In this case the study is completely contained in one data file. The fourth variable is a sequential identification number that the ICPSR has added to uniquely identify each record in the dataset. All variables are numeric character and ranges have been documented in the codebook. Consistency checks have been performed on the data.

The data collection was processed according to the standard ICPSR processing procedures. The data were checked for illegal or inconsistent code values which, when found, were recoded to OSIRIS missing data values. No consistency checks were performed. Statements bracketed in "<" and ">" signs in the body of the codebook were added by the processors for explanatory purposes.

## GLOSSARY

ADJUDICATED DELINQENT - Detention status of a juvenile who, as the result of a formal and completed judicial proceeding is adjudged a delinquent, usually for a nonstatus offense -- one for which as adult could be prosecuted in a criminal court. Includes some status offenders especially in states without special status offenders statutes. Even in states with such statutes, juveniles with previous offenses can be adiudicated delinquent for status offenses. (Conversely, a judge can deciare a juvenile to be a person in need of supervision for a felony or misdemeanor a- see person in need of supervision.)

AWAITING TRANSFER TO ANOTHER JURISDICTION - Detention status of a juvenile who allegedly has committed a crime in or runaway from another jurisdction and is being held pending return to that jurisdiction. Includes runaways from other correctional facilities. Excludes adjudicated delinquents awaiting placement in a correctional facility.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURES - Includes spending now for new buildings, major repairs or improvements, and new equipment costing $\$ 1,000$ or more, but excludes single expenditures of less than $\$ 1,000$.

CHILD IN NEED OF SUPERVISION (CHINS) - see person in need of supervision.

COMMUNITY VOLUNTEERS - Full-time and part-time personnel who receive NO compensation of any type, such as salaries payments, or cless credit, for their services at the facility.

DEPENDENT AND NEGLECTED - A juvenile over whom a juvenile court assumes jurisdiction because of its finding that the care exercised by parent, guardian, or custodian falls short of a legal standard for proper care. Excludes juveniles held on delinquency charges, adjudicated delinquents, and those declared in need of supervision, even if they also could be considered dependent and neglected.

DETENTION CENTER - A short-term facility that provides temporary care in a physically restricting environment for juveniles in custody pending court disposition and, often, for juveniles who are adjudicated deiinquent or are awaiting transfer to another jurisdiction.

DETENTION STATUS - One of the following statuses under which juveniles are held: adjudicated delinquent, person in need of supervision, held pending court disposition, awaiting transfer to another jurisdiction, voluntary admission, and dependent and neglected.

GROUP HDME - see HALFWAY HOUSE AND GROUP HOME.

HALFWAY HOUSE AND GROUP HOME - A long-term facility in which residents are allowed extensive contact with the community such as attending school or working on a job.

HELD PENDING COURT DISPOSITION - Detention status of a juvenile who has not had any hearing or who has had only a preliminary screening, detention, or similar hearing and is awaiting further court action.

JUVENILE - In most states, a person under 18. With respect to juveniles in custody, a person subject to juvenile court proceedings because a statutorily defined event is alleged to have occurred while his/her age was below the statutorily specified limit of original jurisdiction or a juvenile court.

JUVENILE IN NEED OF SUPERVISION (JINS) - see person in need of supervision.

LONG-TERM FACILITY - A correctional, as opposed to a detention, facility. Includes training schools; ranches, forestry camps, and farms; and halfway houses and group homes.

MINOR IN NEED OF SUPERVISION (MINS) - see person in need of supervision.

NONJUVENILE - With respect to persons in custody, one within the original jurisdiction of a criminal rather than a juvenile court because his/her age at the tine of an alleged crime was above the statutorily specified limit.

NONPAYROLL STAFF - Full-time or part-time staff who are NOT on the payroll of this facility. Includes personnel of a parent agency or other agency or service (including school system), who are assigned for some or all of their working time to this facility; also include personnel paid under contractual agreements or Federal grants and college interns who receive class credit for their work at the facility.

OPERATING EXPENDITURES - Gross salaries and wages, plus other operating expenditures.

PAYKOLL STAFF - Full-time and part-time staff on the payroll of the reporting facility.

PERSON IN NEED OF SUPERVISION (PINS) - Detention status of a juvenile declared by a juvenile court to be in need of supervision. Encompasses those known variously as child in need of supervision (CHINS), juvenile in need of supervision (JINS), and minor in need of supervision (MINS), as well as those designated as unruly, unmanageable, or incorrigible under special statutes for status offenders. All PINS are not status offenders, and all status offenders are not PINS. Even in States with status offenders statutes, juveniles with previous offenses can be adjudicated delinquent for status offenses. Conversely, a judge can declare a juvenile to be a person in need of supervision for a felony or misdemeanor.

RANCH, FORESTRY CAMP, AND FARM - A long-term residential facility for persons whose behavior does not necessitate

- the strict confinement of a training school, of ten allowing them greater contact with the community.

RECEPTION OR DIAGNOSTIC CENTER - A short-term facility that screens persons committed by courts and assigns them to appropriate correctional facilities.

RESIDENT - A person, juvenile or nonjuvenile, held in a juvenile detention or correctional facility.

SHELTER - A short-term facility that provides temporary care similar to that of a detention center, but in a physically unrestricting environment.
