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The Bureau of Justice Statistics is part of the Office of Justice Programs, which also includes the Bureau of Justice Assistance, the National Institute of Justice, the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, and the Office for Victims of Crime.

This is the sixth volume in an annual series describing in detail the characteristics of persons admitted to and released from the prison and parole systems in the United States. The report presents data gathered from the 1990 National Corrections Reporting Program (NCRP). The NCRP, begun in 1983, evolved from the need to improve and consolidate corrections reporting at the national level as well as to reduce the States' reporting burden. Before the NCRP, the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) sponsored the National Prisoner Statistics Admissions and Releases Program and the Uniform Parole Reports to collect data.

Thirty-five States and the Federal Bureau of Prisons contributed the offenderspecific data that made this report possible. As we look forward to the inclusion of all States in this national series, we at BJS gratefully acknowledge the generous contribution of the State and Federal respondents who have enabled us to produce this volume.

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Reporting criteria

The NCRP collects data on all prison admissions and releases and on all parole entries and discharges for calendar vear 1990 in participating lurisdictions. Multiple admissions or releases per person during the year are recorded as separate events. The NCRP data cover prisoners admitted to or released from custody regardless of the jurisdiction where the prisoner was sentenced. Persons sentenced to a State prison but admitted to or released from the custody of a local jail are included in the NCRP.

Beginning in 1983 all sentenced inmates. including those with a total sentence of a year or less, were counted. To assure greater comparability across jurisdictions, the 1990 report includes only inmates with a sentence of more than a year except where noted. Information on all inmates, including those with a sentence of a year or less, is contained in the public-use data tape that may be obtained from the National Archive of Criminal Justice Data at the University of Michigan.

Offenses

Each State's offenses are recoded to a common set of offense codes. In this report, attempts and conspiracies are included with completed offenses, except for attempted murders and conspiracies to commit murder, which are classified as assaults.

Offense types appearing in this report include the following offenses:

Homicide — murder, felony murder, nonnegligent manslaughter, voluntary manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, involuntary manslaughter, and unspecified homicide.

Murder/nonnegligent manslaughter murder, felony murder, nonnegligent manslaughter, and voluntary manslaughter.

Murder — murder and felony murder.

Nonnegligent manslaughtervoluntary manslaughter, nonnegligent manslaughter, and aggravated manslaughter.

Manslaughter --- negligent manslaughter, vehicular manslaughter, involuntary manslaughter, and negligent homicide.

Unspecified homicide — homicide and nomicide type not specified.

Kidnaping - abduction, kidnaping, and felonious restraint.

Rape - forcible rape, aggravated rape, sexual intercourse, and forcible sodomy without consent.

Other sexual assault --- statutory rape, carnal abuse, gross sexual imposition by force, fondling, child molestation, and lewd acts with children.

Robbery — unarmed robbery, armed robbery, aggravated robbery, and forcible purse snatching.

Assault — attempted murder, simple assault, aggravated assault, aggravated battery, vehicular assault, and criminal injury to persons.

Other violent — extortion, intimidation, hit-and-run driving with bodily injury, child abuse, and criminal endangerment against a person.

Burglary — breaking and entering, burglary, and safecracking.

Larceny — theft, petty larceny, and grand larceny.

Motor vehicle theft -- auto theft, conversion of an automobile, receiving and transferring a stolen vehicle, and unauthorized use of a vehicle.

Arson — arson and burning a thing of value.

Fraud - worthless checks, uttering, obtaining money by false pretenses. credit card fraud, fraud, forgery, counterfeiting, and embezzlement.

Stolen property -- possession, transportation, receiving, or selling of stolen property.

Other property — destruction of property, vandalism, criminal tampering, trespassing, entering without breaking, and possession of burglary tools.

Drug possession - possession or use of controlled substances.

Drug trafficking — importation, manufacture, sale, or delivery of controlled substances; possession with intent to deliver.

Other drug — forging or uttering a false prescription for a controlled substance: possession of drug paraphernalia, unknown drug offenses, and violations of controlled substance acts where the type of violation was unspecified.

Weapons - unlawful sale, distribution, manufacture, transportation, or possession of a deadly or dangerous weapon.

Driving while intoxicated — drunk driving and driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

Other public-order—escape from custody, court offenses, obstruction, driving while intoxicated, other traffic offenses, drunkenness, disorderly conduct, morals and decency violations, commercialized vice, and liquor law violations.

Methodology

Other offenses - luvenile offenses and unspecified felonies.

Federal offenses were recoded to many of the same categories defined above. Specific Federal categories include the following:

Embezzlement --- postal, bank, and benefit plans.

Fraud -- postal, passport, Veterans' and other benefits, government employment, banks, computer, and impersonation.

Counterfeiting - postal, money orders, securities, and altering or forging currency.

Regulatory - violation of banking and insurance laws, smuggling, violation of customs, election laws, food and drug laws, maritime and railroad laws, retirement act and unemployment insurance, communication law, and other regulatory provisions.

Immigration — illegal entry, harboring or smuggling illegal aliens, and other immigration violations.

Tax law — internal revenue violations, including tax fraud, tax evasion, and failure to pay excise, alcohol, inheritance, withholding, Social Security, or other taxes.

Racketeering and extortion — threats through the mail, over the phone, or in interstate commerce, labor racketeering, RICO, money laundering, and interference with commerce by threat or violence.

Sentences

Data on sentence length refer to the offense with the longest sentence. Whenever a sentence had both a minimum and a maximum term, the maximum was used to define the sentence length. A life sentence was defined as any prison sentence with a

fixed or maximum term of life in prison. regardless of the possibility of parole.

Time served

Time served refers to the amount of time spent in prison between the date of admission and the date of release or to the amount of time spent on parole between the date of prison release and the date of parole discharge. Time served in prison underestimates the actual time served because data on time spent in fail that was credited to the prison sentence for the current offense are not available for most inmates. All tables in the report present data for time served in prison only.

Total time under supervision was calculated by adding time spent in prison and time spent on parole. Once again, lail-time credits are not included in the estimate of the total time under supervision.

Median and mean

The medians in this report were calculated from ungrouped data, since sentencing data do not conform to the standard assumptions permitting calculations from grouped data. Because nearly all sentences are multiples of 12-month units, the assumption of an even distribution of values within groups is not met. Therefore, a shift of only a few cases may increase or decrease the median by 12 months.

In contrast to the calculation of medians, mean sentence lengths exclude prisoners with a sentence of life in prison or death. Medians are sensitive to the uneven distribution of cases: means are influenced by extreme values.

Because of the limitations of each measure, both medians and means were reported for sentence length.

Time served data do not group at 12month intervals. Both medians and means have been reported in most tables to provide an accurate summary of the data.

Year-to-year comparisons

Care should be exercised when comparing 1990 data on sentence length and time served to data published for 1989 and previous years. Year-to-year comparisons should be restricted to those jurisdictions reporting data in all years of interest. The group of jurisdictions participating in 1990, however, differed from the group in the previous vears. States reporting in the 1990 program were Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, and Wisconsin. The Federal Bureau of Prisons and the Federal Parole Commission also reported data.

Subgroup comparisons

Care should be exercised when comparing groups of inmates on sentence length and time served. Differences may be the result of factors not described in the tables, including variations in the criminal histories of each group, variations in the offense composition of each group, and variations among participating lurisdictions in their sentencing and correctional practices.

Race

California codes Asians/Pacific Islanders as "unknown."

Colorado, Illinois, Minnesota, New York, Oklahoma, and Texas code inmates of Hispanic origin as "unknown."

Ohio codes American Indians/Alaska Natives, and Asians/Pacific Islanders as "unknown."

South Carolina's parole release records code any persons other than white or black as "unknown."

Hispanic origin

In California, Michigan, and Oklahoma, Hispanics include only those of Mexican origin.

In New York, Hispanics include only persons of Puerto Rican birth or parentage.

Federal parole release data on Hispanic origin were not available for persons released from prison before July 1983.

Education

Maryland data include credits for education received after entering prison for parole discharge records only.

Ohio data include people who have a college degree in the category of "some college."

Admission date

For New York parole release records the date of admission is the original admission date, rather than the most recent date, if the inmate had been released and then returned.

For Federal parole release records the date of sentencing is provided instead of the date of admission. This date is accurate for only new court commitments.

Admission type

In Colorado and New York, "new court commitments" includes some parole violators returned with new sentences.

In Minnesota, "new court commitments" includes probation violators.

In Massachusetts, "transfers" includes returns to prison after court appearance, temporary interstate transfers, transfers from other States, Federal transfers, transfers from county to State custody, and transfers from other secure facilities.

In Hawaii and Maryland, "new court commitments" includes all types of admissions.

Nebraska reported the following types of admissions: regular, multipleoffender, evaluator, Federal safekeeper, county safekeeper, and other. Since these could not be translated into the NCRP categories. they were coded as "missing/invalid data entries".

In Nevada, "parole revocation, new sentence" and "parole revocation, no new sentence" may have been underreported.

In Ohio, "new court commitments" include an undetermined number of parole violators returned with new sentences.

For parole release records in New York, admission type for parole revocations were reported for those with no new sentence only. There are no probation revocations because probation is considered a county function.

In North Carolina, "probation revocation" includes persons whose parole status was pending.

In Minnesota, "parole revocation with or without new sentence" includes mandatory parole violators returned and work release violators returned.

In North Carolina, "parole revocation, no sentence information" includes all parole violators with or without new sentences as well as pending parole revocations.

In South Carolina, "parole revocation, no sentence information" includes revocation of Supervised Furlough II releases and Emergency Powers Act releases.

In Texas, "parole revocation, no sentence information" and "mandatory parole revocation, no sentence information" include all parole revocations, with or without new sentences.

In Wisconsin, "parole revocation, new sentence" and "parole revocation, no new sentence" include returns of inmates released early because of overcrowding.

In South Carolina, "escapees returned" are not counted as admissions.

In Texas, "not known" includes inmates returning from vocational or educational programs.

Offenses

New Jersey, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and South Carolina, reported only one offense — the most serious.

Minnesota reports only most recent offense instead of the most serious.

For Federal parole release records. only two offenses per inmate are reported, usually the two most serious, for parole release records. If an inmate receives an additional offense after admission that is more serious than the original offenses, the inmate's record is updated to show that offense.

Explanatory notes

Maximum sentence and total maximum sentence

In Illinois and Maryland persons receiving indeterminate sentences were reported as "not known" on sentence lenath.

In Virginia "life" includes prisoners with sentences of "life without parole" and death.

in Washington, the category "life" includes "life without parole."

Texas reports only total maximum sentence instead of maximum sentence for the offense with the longest sentence.

Minimum time to be served

Maryland did not report "minimum sentence" because there is no statute establishing minimum sentence.

Prison release date

In the Federal prison system and Maryland, the prison release date on parole exit records is the date parole supervision begins, not the actual release date.

Prison release method

In Massachusetts, "parole board decision" includes some inmates released by the Massachusetts parole board to another parole board.

In New York, "parole board decision" includes some inmates released by "commutation/pardon,"

On prison release records in South Carolina, "parole board decision" includes inmates released from a Youthful Offenders Act sentence to a straight sentence and vice versa. Also "other unconditional release" includes those inmates who paid a fine after serving some prison time; those whose sentence was reduced; those who were retried; and those released for medical reasons. On parole release records. "parole board decision" includes inmates released to supervised furlough.

In Wisconsin, "parole board decision" includes early releases because of overcrowding.

In New York, "mandatory parole releases" includes early releases for good time served.

In Minnesota, "other conditional releases" includes work releases.

Mississippi's "other conditional releases" includes split sentences, work release, and supervised earned releases.

New York codes "releases to custody. detainer, or warrant" as either "parole board decision" or "mandatory parole release."

In Ohio, "other conditional releases" consists of releases for educational or vocational purposes, inmates paroled or shock paroled, on detainer, and under interstate compact.

In Oklahoma, "transfers to probation and probation from house arrest" are coded as "probation release."

In South Carolina, "other conditional releases" consists of Emergency Powers Act releases, which include Supervised Furlough II, the Emergency Prison Overcrowding Powers Act, and EPA II.

For the California Youth Authority. "other conditional releases" includes some discharges to prison.

"Other unconditional releases" in Maryland, Ohio, and Texas consists of court-ordered releases.

"Other unconditional releases" in Minnesota consists of discharges of persons with indeterminate sentences by the releasing authority.

In Mississippi, "other unconditional releases" includes shock probation, court suspensions, and court-ordered releases.

In Nebraska, "other unconditional releases" consists of persons whose sentence was vacated.

In Tennessee, "other unconditional releases" consists of unconditional releases to probation.

In Ohlo, "other releases" consists of inmates-at-large who dld not belong to any other NCRP category.

in Texas, "other releases" includes inmates released to attend vocational or educational facilities.

In Washington, some 1,200 inmates coded as released by "parole board decision" or "mandatory release" were actually "transferred."

Explanatory notes

Maximum sentence and total maximum sentence

In Illinois and Maryland persons receiving indeterminate sentences were reported as "not known" on sentence length.

In Virginia "life" includes prisoners with sentences of "life without parole" and death.

In Washington, the category "life" includes "life without parole."

Texas reports only total maximum sentence instead of maximum sentence for the offense with the longest sentence.

Minimum time to be served

Maryland did not report "minimum sentence" because there is no statute establishing minimum sentence.

Prison release date

In the Federal prison system and Maryland, the prison release date on parole exit records is the date parole supervision begins, not the actual release date.

Prison release method

In Massachusetts, "parole board decision" includes some inmates released by the Massachusetts parole board to another parole board.

In New York, "parole board decision" includes some inmates released by "commutation/pardon."

New York codes "releases to custody, detainer, or warrant" as either "parole board decision" or "mandatory parole release."

In Ohio, "other conditional releases" consists of releases for educational or vocational purposes, inmates paroled or shock paroled, on detainer, and under interstate compact.

In Washington, some 1,200 inmates coded as released by "parole board decision" or "mandatory release" were actually "transferred."

Parole release method

in the Federal prison system, "discharged, completion of term" includes absconders, inmates whose convictions were reversed, and inmates who were pardoned.

Maryland includes inmates who failed to comply with special conditions of their parole as "discharged, absconder."

In New York, "other release" includes parole board decision (discretionary after 3 years) court-ordered releases; new revocations, not pursued; and cases in the revocation process in which statutory requirements were not fulfilled.

In Pennsylvania, "other releases" includes persons who have reached their maximum expiration date and are in one of the following categories: criminal charges pending, absconder, and returned to home State.

Parole release records

For Massachusetts, these numbers are an estimation because not all regional offices were automated at the time of submission.

In 1990, 35 States and the California Youth Authority reported 390,087 admissions accounting for nearly 90% of all admissions to State prisons in that year. (See "Prisoners in State and Federal Institutions, 1990 in Correctional Populations in the United States, 1990, NCJ-134946.) The 1990 data on entering prisoners provide a profile which resembles that of past reports. Inmate subgroup differences for sentence length and time to be served may have resulted from factors not described in the tables. (See Methodology, page 2.)

- New court commitments offenders entering prison directly from a sentence by a court and not from an unsuccessful period of community supervision comprised almost two-thirds of all prison admissions (table 1-1). Parole violators accounted for more than a quarter of all admissions.
- Males comprised 92% of all admissions to State prisons (table 1-2).
- Whites accounted for 46% of all State prison admissions; blacks, 53%; and other races, primarily American Indians and Asians, 1%. Hispanics of all races made up 20% of all reported prison admissions. The median age of all admissions was 28 years.
- More than a quarter of the persons entering prison had been convicted of a violent offense (table 1-5). Robbery was the most common violent crime, accounting for 9% of new court commitments.
- About 1 of every 3 men and 2 of every 5 women had been convicted of a drug offense. Slightly more than 40% of Hispanic prisoners had been convicted of a drug offense.

- Of new court commitments under 18 years old, 50% of the black offenders were admitted for a violent offense, compared to 32% of the white offenders (table 1-6). Of those age 45 or older, whites (39%) were more likely than blacks (26%) to have been admitted to prison for a violent offense.
- The median maximum sentence length for persons admitted to prison in 1990 was 48 months (table 1-9).
- Violent offenses carried the longest median maximum sentence (72 months).
- The median sentence for property was 36 months; drug offenses, 42 months; and public-order offenses, 24 months.
- The median sentence for murder was 50 years in prison, longer than for any other individual offense.
- Overali, black prisoners received median sentences 12 months longer than white prisoners (48 months compared to 36 months) (table 1-10). Black offenders also received longer median sentences for violent, drug, and public-order offenses. Black and white prisoners had the same median sentence for property offenses.

- State correctional officials were asked to estimate a minimum time that admitted prisoners would have to serve before becoming eligible for release (table 1-11). Factors used in this estimate include minimum sentence length, good-time credits, earned-time credits, parole eligibility requirements, and early release requirements and allowances. In those States reporting both maximum sentence length and minimum time to be served, the median sentence length was 48 months and entering prisoners were expected to serve half of that time, 24 months.
- The median minimum time to be served by violent offenders was 36 months; by property and drug offenders, 20 months; and by public-order offenders, 18 months.
- The average estimated minimum time to be served for men was 50% of their mean maximum sentence versus 44% for women (table 1-12).
- In 1990, sentences of life in prison or death were received by 2% of all offenders who entered prison; slightly less than half of the murderers received a sentence of life or death sentence (table 1-14).




Figure 1-1. Maximum sentence length for new court commitments, by offense

Release data for 1990 are based on information provided by 34 States and the California Youth Authority. These States reported a total of 309,989 releases, which accounted for nearly 80% of the releases from State prisons. (See "Prisoners in State and Federal institutions, 1990" in Correctional Populations in the United States, 1990, NCJ-134946.) Of the total, 227,100 were first releases, those released from prison for the first time on their current sentence. Excluded from first releases were persons who had previously been conditionally released from prison for the same offense and then were returned to prison for violating the conditions of that release. All data on offense distribution and time served are limited to first releases. Inmate subgroup differences for time served may have resulted from factors not described in the tables. (See Methodology, page 2.)

- Over four-fifths of all those released from prison were released conditionally — completing their sentences under supervision in the community (table 2-1).
- Men made up the vast majority (92%) of all persons released from prison (table 2-2). Whites accounted for 48% of all releases; blacks, 51%; and persons of other races, 1%.
- Violent offenders accounted for 25% of the first-time releases; property offenders, 38%; drug offenders, 28%; and public-order offenders, 8% (table 2-3).
- The median time served for murder was 79 months; for nonnegligent manslaughter, 45 months; for rape, 43 months; for robbery, 30 months; and for assault, 16 months.
- Among property offenders the median time served was longest for arson (18 months) and burglary (15 months). The median time served for drug offenses was 11 months.

- Drug traffickers spent an average of 5 months longer than those convicted of drug possession (a median time of 13 months and 8 months, respectively).
- Approximately half of all first releases had served a year or less in prison before their release in 1990; 7% had served more than 60 months (table 2-4).
- Overall, men served longer than women. The median time served was 13 months by men, compared to 9 months by women (table 2-5).
- The median time served for both black and white offenders was the same (13 months) (table 2-6).
- The median time served for blacks was longer than that for whites for all violent offenses except for assault, other sexual assault, and unspecified homicide.
- Among Hispanic first releases, the median time served on a violent offense

- was 25 months in prison; for a property offense, 11 months; a drug offense, 13 months; and a public-order offense, 9 months.
- Among those releases with data reported on minimum time to be served, the median maximum sentence length was 48 months, the minimum time estimated to be served was 18 months, and the time actually served was 18 months (table 2-8). On average, offenders had served over a third of their maximum sentence before release.
- Overall, offenders released through a parole board decision had served a median of 13 months (table 2-9).
 Mandatory parole releases, whose time had been set by statute, had also served a median of 13 months. Unconditional releases had served a median of 17 months.




Figure 2-1. First releases from State prison: Maximum sentence length and time served in prison, by offense

Entries to parole from State prison

Most prisoners leaving State prisons in 1990 were released to supervision in the community. In these data covering 34 States and the California Youth Authority, there were 186,904 first entries to parole supervision from State prisons. These prisoners were released to parole either by decision of a parole board (discretionary parole release) or by provision of the statute under which they were sentenced (mandatory parole release).

State statutes often determine what conditions prisoners must fulfill to enter parole. For example, some States specify the fraction of a sentence that offenders must serve - such as a third or a fourth — before entering parole. Other States have a mandatory minimum time to be served for certain crimes or for specified circumstances of a crime. Yet other States have parole guidelines that set ranges of time to be served for different types of crimes.

- In 1990, males comprised 92% of those entering parole (table 3-1).
- Whites made up 45% of the 1990 parole-entry population, blacks 54%, and other races 1%.
- The median age of persons entering parole was 29 years.
- About 25% of all offenders entering parole supervision had served time for a violent offense; 37% for a property offense: 28% for a drug offense: and about 8% for a public-order offense (table 3-2).
- A higher percentage of releases from State prison entered parole supervision from a parole board decision than from a mandatory parole release (72% versus 28%) (table 3-3).
- The median maximum sentence for all parole entries was 48 months while the

median time served for was 13 months (table 3-4).

- On average, persons paroled in 1990 had served about a third of their maximum sentence in prison prior to their release.
- On average, violent offenders served 35% of their mean total sentence in prison before their parole; property offenders served 24%; drug offenders 22%; and public-order offenders served 29% (table 3-5).




Figure 3-1. First entries to parole from State prison: Method of release and offense

In 1990, 27 States and the California Youth Authority reported 162,959 discharges from parole supervision. These discharges accounted for 83% of all State parole discharges for 1990. (See "Adults leaving parole, 1990" in Correctional Populations in the United States, 1990, NCJ-134946.)

Most parole terms end with a discharge from the supervising agency or a return to prison. Parole revocation rates reflect various factors, including parole policy as well as parolees' behavior. The release of high-risk offenders because of crowded facilities, strict surveillance of parolees, rigid enforcement of parole conditions, and longer parole terms may contribute either singly or in combination to failure rates.

- Among all persons discharged by State paroling agencies in 1990, 36% successfully completed parole (table 4-2).
- Among first discharges from parole, that is, persons released from parole for the first time for a particular offense, 57% completed parole successfully (table 4-3).
- Of State parolees discharged in 1990. almost 70% of the whites and 56% of the blacks had successfully completed parole supervision after their first release from prison on a sentence.
- · Among those who were discharged from supervision, more blacks (40%) than whites (27%) were returned to prison or jail for violating the conditions of parole.
- Individuals convicted of property offenses were the least likely to successfully complete their first parole term (table 4-5).
- Among State parole discharges the highest percentage of returns to prison or jail were reported for offenders serving sentences for motor vehicle theft (53%), burglary (50%), and robbery (48%).

- On average, successful first State parole discharges served a total time in prison and on parole of 45 months; violent offenders, 63 months; property offenders, 39 months; drug offenders, 36 months; and public-order offenders, 32 months (table 4-6).
- For the major offense categories of violence, property, drug, and publicorder, persons successfully completing parole had served about half of their average time in prison and half on parole. Parolees convicted of murder served on average more than 65% of their total time under correctional supervision in prison.
- On average, men spent more time under correctional supervision than women for every type of offense except negligent manslaughter, other sexual assault, weapons offense, driving while intoxicated, and other public-order offenses (table 4-7).

- Overall, whites had served a mean of 22 months in prison and on parole, while blacks served 24 months in prison and 22 months on parole (table 4-8).
- On average, blacks spent more time under correctional supervision than whites for violent offense; the same time as whites for public-order offenses; and less time than whites for property and drug offenses.
- The average total time served under correctional supervision was 45 months for successful first discharges from State parole compared to 46 months for unsuccessful first discharges (table 4-12). Compared to successful discharges, unsuccessful discharges served 4 months longer in prison but 3 months less on parole before their discharge.




Figure 4-1. Successful State parole discharges: Time served in prison and on parole

Admissions to Federal prison

- In 1990 Federal prisons reported admitting 32,825 persons - 18,476 with sentences of more than 12 months: 13,186 with sentences of 12 months or less; and 1,136 for whom sentence length data were not reported (table 5-1).
- Men comprised 89% of all Federal admissions.
- Whites made up 73% of all offenders admitted to Federal prison: blacks, 25%: and members of other races, primarily Asians and American Indians, 2%.
- Prisoners with sentences of more than 12 months were on average older than those with short sentences (a median age of 33 compared to 30).
- About 8% of blacks admitted to Federal prison, compared to 4% of whites, were violent offenders. Over a third of whites and over half of blacks were entering prison for drug offenses (39% versus 55%, respectively) (table 5-2).
- Among Hispanics admitted to Federal prison, more than half were immigration violators, and over a third were drug offenders.
- A third of offenders with "other" racial origins — Native Americans, Asians, or Pacific Islanders — were admitted for violent offenses, particularly assault (12%) and other sexual assault (10%).
- Approximately 64% of all persons admitted to Federal prison with a sentence of more than 12 months had been convicted of drug abuse violations - 40% convicted of trafficking and 25% of other or unspecified drug offenses (table 5-7).
- · Among prisoners admitted with sentences of 12 months or less. 45% were convicted of immigration law violations, 14% were convicted of drug violations, and 18% were convicted of fraudulent offenses, such as embezzlement, fraud, or counterfeiting.

- Overall, 6% of persons admitted to Federal prison in 1990 had been convicted of a violent offense.
- The median maximum sentence for all admissions was 24 months (table 5-9). The large number of short-sentenced immigration offenders, who comprised 19% of all admissions, heavily influenced this median.
- The median sentence of all admissions for a violent offense was 57 months. while that for drug offenders was 60 months. The median sentence for a property offense was 12 months and for public- order offenses, 4 months.
- For those entering prison with a sentence of more than 12 months, the median maximum sentence was 60

- months; for violent offenses, 64 months; for property, 27 months; public-order offenses, 36 months; and for drug offenses, 60 months.
- Men entering Federal prison had received a median maximum sentence that was 6 months longer than that of women (median sentences of 24 months and 18 months, respectively) (table 5-
- The overall median sentence length for whites admitted to prison was 18 months, a median influenced by the large number of short sentences among immigration violators. The median sentence for blacks was 41 months.




Figure 5-1. Maximum sentence length for new court commitments, by offense

Releases from Federal prison

- In 1990, 36% of the 33,322 prisoners leaving Federal prison for the first time on a sentence were released conditionally to supervision in the community (table 6-1). Mandatory parole, a release established by statutory guidelines rather than a parole board decision, comprised nearly 41% of the conditional releases.
- Among the first releases sentenced to more than 12 months, 30% left prison when their sentence expired, and 64% left before expiration, with conditions attached to the remainder of the sentence.
- Males constituted the majority (90%) of all releases from Federal prison (table 6-2). Whites accounted for 74% of the releases; blacks, 24%; and members of other races, 2%.
- Hispanics comprised 38% of the first releases from Federal prison. More than half of those with sentences of 12 months or less were Hispanic.
- About 61% of first releases from Federal prison in 1990 had served less then 12 months, and 17% had served 13 to 24 months (table 6-3). Overall, 22% of the prisoners released for the first time on a sentence had been in prison more than 2 years.
- Among first releases with sentences of 12 months or less; 56% served less than 4 months before their release. The median time served was 3 months (table 6-4). This median is relatively low because immigration offenders served a median of 2 months. Immigration offenders accounted for 46% of first releases with sentences of 12 months or less.
- Of first releases sentenced to more than 12 months, half served 23 months or less before their release (table 6-5).

- First releases with sentences of more than 12 months served a median of 47 months in prison for violent offenses; 25 months for drug offenses; 19 months for property offenses; and 18 months for public-order offenses.
- Among individual offenses, the median time served for kidnaping was the longest, 79 months; for homicide, 66 months; for rape and assault, 50 months; for robbery, 47 months; for arson, 36 months; for burglary, 31 months; and for drug trafficking, 24 months.
- For mean time served by first releases with sentences of more than 12 months, men served more time in prison than women for every offense except regulatory and immigration offenses (table 6-8).
- Overall, men served a median of 24 months, and women, 19 months. For male violent offenders the median time served was 10 months longer than that

- for women; for male property offenders, 4 months longer; for male drug offenders, 4 months longer; and for male public-order offenders, 2 months longer.
- For first releases sentenced to more than 12 months, little difference separated the median time served by white and black offenders, except for violent offenses (table 6-10). Black violent offenders served 14 months longer than white offenders (a median sentence of 59 months and 45 months, respectively) (See Methodology, page 2).
- · Mandatory releases with sentences of more than 12 months served 32 months in prison, 1 month longer than discretionary releases (table 6-11).
- Prisoners released at the expiration of their term served the least amount of time, a median of 13 months.




Figure 6-1. First releases from Federal prison, maximum sentence length and time served in prison, by offense

Entries to parole from Federal prison

- Men made up 92% of the 9,216 entries to parole from Federal prison in 1990 (table 7-1).
- · White offenders comprised 72% of all parole entries; black offenders, 26%; and offenders of other races, 3%. Hispanic entries, who could be of any race, were 19% of the total.
- The median age for paralees at the time of their release from prison was 37 years.
- On average, parole entries had graduated from high school. Sixteen percent had completed eight grades or less.
- Among first releases from Federal prison to parole, 54% had been released by a parole board, and 46% were mandatory releases (table 7-3).
- A higher percentage of public-order offenders than of other offenders was

- released from prison and entered parole as a result of mandatory guidelines. Sixty-four percent of weapons violators were mandatory entries.
- Among parole entries for whom complete data exist on maximum sentence and time served in prison, half served 32 months or less in prison on a median maximum sentence of 60 months (table 7-4).
- Violent and drug offenders on average served a smaller proportion of their maximum sentences than other types of offenders. The mean time served in prison by violent offenders, 63 months, was 48% of the mean maximum sentence; the mean time served by drug offenders, 34 months, was 46% of the mean maximum sentence. The mean time served by property offenders was 28 months and 51% of the mean sentence and by public-order offenders, 32 months or 53%.

- Among first releases, the average time served in prison before a discretionary release and a mandatory release was the same, 36 months (table 7-5).
- Among violent offenders, discretionary releases had served 14 months longer on average than mandatory releases (a mean of 71 months compared to 57).
- For all offenses among parole entries for whom complete data exist on mean maximum sentence length and mean time served in prison, whites served a greater percentage of their sentence in prison before being released (48%) than did blacks (46%) (table 7-6). The mean maximum sentence of white parolees was 73 months and mean time served was 35 months. The mean sentence of black parolees was 82 months, and time served, 38 months.




Figure 7-1. First rentries to parole from Federal prison: Offense and time served



Discharges from Federal parole

- Among the 9,428 individuals discharged from Federal parole, 69% were successful in leaving supervision and reentering the community, 22% were returned to prison, and 1% died (table 8-1).
- Women were slightly more likely to complete parole successfully than were men (74% and 68%, respectively). White parolees (76%) were more likely than blacks (53%) to have successfully completed parole.
- Among Federal parole discharges, violent offenders were the most likely to be returned to prison (table 8-3). Fortyeight percent of the violent offenders were returned to prison, compared to 25% of the property, 18% of the drug, and 17% of the public-order offenders.
- Overall, drug offenders were the largest group discharged from Federal parole. (43%)(table 8-4). Property offenders were second largest at 27%, followed by violent, 15%; and public-order offenders, 14%.
- Among those successfully discharged from parole, 47% were drug offenders; 27% were property offenders; 15% were public-order offenders; and 10% were violent offenders. Drug trafficking was the largest individual offense group (46%), rollowed by robbery (8%).
- For those persons unsuccessfully discharged from parole and returned to prison, 28% were property offenders; 30% violent offenders; 32% drug offenders: 10% were public-order offenders --- as categorized by the sentence for which they were paroled. Drug trafficking was the largest individual offense group (32%), followed by robbery (26%) and larceny/theft (9%).
- The median time served on parole for all offenses was 16 months (table 8-5). The median time on parole for violent offenses was 22 months; for property and public-order offenses, 15 months; and drug, 18 months.

- Among those who successfully. completed parole, whites had a longer median time served on parole than blacks, except for violent offenders (table 8-6). Overall, whites spent 2 more months on parole than did blacks. Among violent offenders the median time on parole was 5 months longer for blacks than for whites; among other offenders the median time was 3 months longer for whites.
- Among parolees returning to prison, the median time served on parole for whites was 2 months longer than for blacks (18 versus 16 months) (table 8-7). Among violent offenders returned to prison, black

- parolees had been on parole for a median of 20 months and white parolees for a median of 17 months.
- Successful parole discharges for whom data were reported on both time in prison and on parole served a median of 28 months in prison and 16 months on parole (table 8-8). Unsuccessful parole discharges served a median of 47 months in prison and 16 months on parole.

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
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
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
