### I. Purpose

The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) sponsors the Sample Survey of Jails as part of a series of statistical programs measuring the correctional population. A complete census of local jails is conducted every five years. In the intervening years this Sample Survey provides basic data for the national jail population on an annual basis. The first Sample Survey was conducted in 1982 and was followed by a complete census of jails in 1983. Sample Surveys have been conducted in 1984 and, most recently, in 1985.

The Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 as amended (42 U.S.C. 3732), authorizes the collection of this information. The Sample Survey meets BJS's need to analyze continuously the "spillover" effect on local jails of the dramatic growth in Federal and State prison populations. When The first Sample Survey was conducted in 1982, the results indicated that the jail population had increased by one-third since 1978 when the last census had been taken. The 1984 Sample Survey showed a 5.1 percent increase in the jail population since the 1983 census was taken.

The data are used in conjunction with statistics on Federal and State prisoners to provide a complete picture of the adult correctional system and to measure changes in that system. Accurate information on jail and prison populations is vital to policymakers and the general public in assessing the demands placed on correctional resources.

### II. Methodology

The sample for 1984 through 1987 was selected from the 1983 Census of Jails universe file. The sampling unit is the county or city jurisdiction that administers one or more local jails. When a jurisdiction was selected for inclusion in the sample, all local jails in the jurisdiction were included in the sample. The design is a stratified simple random sample of jurisdictions stratified by average daily population (ADP) as reported in the 1983 Census of Local Jails. All jurisdictions with ADP of 100 or more are in the sample with certainty. All local jails in a certainty jurisdiction are in the sample with certainty and these jails do not necessarily individually have an ADP of 100 or more.

Two questionnaires were used in the survey. The CJ-5 form was mailed to jails in certainty jurisdictions. The CJ-5A form was mailed to jails in a sample of the remaining jurisdictions. In addition to the questions on inmate population and movement, the CJ-5 contained questions about inmate deaths and about court orders for crowding and for conditions of confinement.

Two mailouts were conducted during July and August 1985. Telephone followup to nonrespondents took place during October and November. The final response rate for the survey was 100 percent for CJ-5A's (536 questionnaires) and 95 percent for the CJ-5's (583 questionnaires). During the 1985 survey adjustments were made for the followup turnovers of facilities: 13 facilities were closed; six new facilities were opened; five facilities were found to be out of scope as lockups or holding facilities and three facilities were determined to be integral parts of others already in the sample. The 1985 questionnaires had been sent to 1,157 facilities; after these adjustments, 1,142 facilities remained in the sample.

### III. Limitations of the Data

Errors in data which result from questionnaire design, improper reporting, nonresponse, examination and tabulation procedures, etc., are referred to as non-sampling error. Several procedures were implemented to avoid errors of this nature.

In addition to the telephone nonresponse followups, a telephone technical followup was conducted as part of the manual edit of the questionnaires. Data on the 1985 report were compared with data on the 1984 report for each jail in the survey. Data were carefully examined for consistency and accuracy and questionable information was verified. Data from the 1984 Sample Survey of Jails were used to estimate items of data not available from respondents in 1985.

The quality control procedures applied were designed to achieve a high standard of completeness and accuracy. Nevertheless, some mistakes and inconsistencies of official reporting or of Census Bureau handling may have escaped detection.

Estimates based on a sample survey are apt to differ somewhat from the results of a survey convassing <u>all</u> jurisdictions, even if both are conducted using the same schedules and procedures. Each of the samples that could have been selected using the same sample design would yield somewhat different results. The standard error is a measure of the variation among the estimates from all possible samples. It is, therefore, a measure of the precision with which an estimate from a particular sample approximates the average result of all possible samples.

The estimated relative sampling error for the total inmate population, calculated from the results of the sample, was 0.6 percent. This figure met the design specification that the relative standard error be 1 percent or less. Estimates of sampling error are shown in Attachment 1. Estimated standard errors with fewer than 200 estimated inmates should be interpreted with caution.

IV. Item Explanations for the 1985 Sample Survey of Jails (CJ-5 and CJ-5A questionnaires)

The following item descriptions apply to questionnaire items on the CJ-5 and CJ-5A forms. The CJ-5 questionnaire was sent to all certainty units (jails in jurisdictions with an ADP of 100 or more inmates or with a female inmate ADP of 50 or more as reported to the 1983 Census of Jails) and the CJ-5A was sent to jails in a sample of the remaining jurisdictions.

Description of Identification Variables:

Form Number (ASCII Characters 1-3) - 005 (CJ-5) or 05A (CJ-5A)

Governments Identification (ASCII Characters 4-12)

State number - States are numbered consecutively from 1-51 in alphabetic order. The District of Columbia is coded "09".

Type of government - Code "l" indicates a county level facility; Code "2" indicates city level.

County numbers - a three-digit code specifying the county in which the facility is located. The county codes are available from the Governments Division, Census Bureau.

Unit numbers - a 3 digit code used to indicate the number of jails in a particular jurisdiction. (A jurisdiction is a county or coty that administers one or more jail facilities.)

Check digit (ASCII Character 13) - for Census Bureau use only

Agency Identification (ASCII Characters 14-20)

Sector Code - Code "06" signifies an adult correctional facility

Unique number - a five-digit code in which the first two digits are always 60 (this code has meaning only at the Census Bureau) and the last three digits uniquely identify a jail or separate reporting unit within a jurisdiction.

# Agency Name (ASCII Characters 21-53)

# Region Code (ASCII Characters 54)

- 1 = Northeast
- 2 = Midwest
- 3 = South
- 4 = West

### Reference Date (ASCII Characters 55-60)

This date is always 06/30/85, the reference date for the inmate population count.

For the purposes of this report, a person of juvenile age is considered a juvenile even though tried as an adult in criminal court.

**Adult criminal offender** — a person subject to the original jurisdiction of the criminal court rather than the juvenile court because at the time of the offense the person was above a statutory age limit.

**Youthful offender** — a person adjudicated in criminal court, who may be above the statutory age limit for juveniles but below a specified upper age limit and for whom special correctional commitments and special record-sealing procedures are made available by statute. For the purposes of this report **youthful offenders** should be considered adults.
